Re: Amendment to Senate Regulation 476.C on transfer pathways

Dear Larry and Judy:

At its meeting on June 6, the Academic Assembly approved amendments to SR 476.C that add the following two pathways to transfer admission in addition to the existing one: (1) Completion of a UCTransfer Curriculum (in the relevant major), and (2) completion of an approved Associate Degree for Transfer (in the relevant major) from a California Community College. The revised regulation, as well as a version showing the changes, is attached for your information.

BOARS will finalize changes to the implementation guidelines, over which it has authority, in consultation with the admissions directors at its meeting in early July. After the meeting, we will circulate the amended regulation and implementation guidelines, along with a document explaining the changes, which should be distributed widely. In the meantime, we wish to inform you that the regulation, as amended, is in effect.


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



- (2) Completion of an SB 1440 Associate Degree for Transfer in the applicant's chosen major at a California Community College.
- (3) Completion of the minimum criteria of seven courses specified below along with 60 (90 quarter) transferrable units.
 - 1. Two transferable college courses (3 semester or 4-5 quarter units each) in English Composition. One of the English Composition courses is to be equivalent in level to the transferable course which would satisfy (on some campuses only in part) the English Composition requirement at the University. The second course can be (but is not required to be) the 'English Composition/ Critical Thinking' course used to satisfy part of the English Communication requirement of the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum specified in SR 478. Courses designed exclusively for the satisfaction of remedial composition requirements as defined in SR 761 cannot be used to satisfy this requirement.
 - **2.** One transferable college course (3 semester or 4-5 quarter units) in Mathematical Concepts and Quantitative Reasoning.
 - **3.** Four additional transferable college courses (3 semester or 4-5 quarter units each) chosen from at least two of the following subject areas: the Arts and Humanities; the Social and Behavioral Sciences; and the Physical and Biological Sciences.

The minimum acceptable grade point average will be set by each division and must be at least 2.4 and can not exceed 3.0. The UC Transfer Curricula are developed by the departments and programs in each Division and approved by the appropriate divisional committee.

Senate Regulations, Part II: Admission Changes to SR 476 C

SR 476 C. An applicant who did not meet the requirements specified in (A) or (B) may be admitted to the University provided the applicant has completed 60 semester (90 quarter) units of transferable college course work, has maintained a grade-point average set by the campus in transferable college course work, has completed all transferable courses with a grade of C or higher, and has completed one of the following pathways:

- (1) Completion of the UC Transfer Curricula for the applicant's chosen major along with 60 (90 quarter) transferrable units.
- (2) Completion of an SB 1440 Associate Degree for Transfer in the applicant's chosen major at a California Community College.
- (3) Completion of the minimum criteria of seven courses specified below along with 60 (90 quarter) transferrable units.
 - 1. Two transferable college courses (3 semester or 4-5 quarter units each) in English Composition. One of the English Composition courses is to be equivalent in level to the transferable course which would satisfy (on some campuses only in part) the English Composition requirement at the University. The second course can be (but is not required to be) the 'English Composition/ Critical Thinking' course used to satisfy part of the English Communication requirement of the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum specified in SR 478. How to Respond to a Request for a Syllabus — An Important Message from Your Articulation Officer

Hello Mesa Community,

Welcome Back!

Many four-year colleges, universities and former students may request to receive a course syllabus from you. The reason for the request is usually due to the need for an evaluation of a course for equivalency in meeting an academic requirement in a major or for graduation.

Within the California Community College system, the official document that is used to appropriately evaluate courses in meeting an academic requirement is the course outline. The course outline is the document that is used by Articulation Officers in establishing and maintaining articulation agreements as it includes all of the necessary components required for an institution to appropriately make articulation decisions.

We are currently challenged with establishing and maintaining articulation agreements. Several courses have been denied articulation due to the use of the syllabus by four-year colleges and universities in making course equivalency/articulation decisions. Information contained in our syllabi varies and often lacks the necessary content required for course equivalency/articulation evaluation.

I respectfully request that you **not** provide a syllabus to anyone other than students enrolled in current course(s). If a request for a syllabus is received, please direct the individual to CurricUNET http://www.sdccdcurricu.net/sdccd2/ to obtain a course outline. Active course outlines are available to the public without the need for a user name or password. You may also re-direct requests to Claudia Cuz-Flores or me in the Articulation Office. For tracking purposes, please copy me in your message when responding to a request for a syllabus.

Thank you so much for your continued contribution to articulation efforts. I truly appreciate your support over the past two years.
