

Mesa Pathways 101: Starting with the end in mind

- Programs organized into career-focused "meta-majors" that enhance student recruitment and exploration and program improvement;
- **Clearly mapped paths** to degrees, employment, and further education in collaboration with employers and universities;
- Structured counseling/advising that helps students choose, enter, and complete a program, of study;
- Academic support that enable students to take and pass critical program courses in their first year of college; and
- Trained faculty and staff who facilitate these reforms.


