MESA COLLEGE POISED TO SERVE UNDERREPRESENTED STUDENTS

In April, 2012, Mesa College was designated by the Department of Education as a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI).

Nearly a year later, Mesa College successfully competed for and gained AANAPISI eligibility. The Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI) is a federal program designed to support higher education institutions in their efforts to increase institutional self-sufficiency by improving institutional management, fiscal stability and academic programs.



"The AANAPISI designation goes hand-in-hand with the college's designation as a HSI-serving institution," noted President Pamela Luster. "It is further acknowledgement of Mesa College's commitment to serving historically underrepresented students, and opens the door to Title V and Title III grants and funding that will enable us to increase access and success for even more students."

FOCUS ON

Institutional Effectiveness refers to the ways in which institutions of higher education strive to optimize and continually improve the extent to how they achieve their core mission and goals.

In order to assure that San Diego Mesa College fulfills its goals (see page left), is responsive to changing needs, and continues to improve, the college in 2012-13 established the Office of Institutional Effectiveness.

Led by Dean **Jill Baker**, the office provides leadership to the college community as it develops, integrates, and improves college- and program-level accreditation, strategic planning, and academic program review and planning. Working with faculty and staff, it will define, create and utilize a number of processes which will offer systematic assessment and support for ongoing effectiveness.

The goal is to help build a campus-wide environment in which:

- analysis and use of relevant data permeates all processes, enabling informed discussion and decision-making,
- results of institutional self-assessment are communicated widely,
- processes provide abundant opportunities for meaningful and inclusive dialogue,
- resource allocation is in alignment with our mission, goals, and priorities, and
- regular assessment of processes and mechanisms assure they support ongoing improvement.

"This office centralizes Mesa's efforts to put into place all of the planning we've worked diligently on for several years," said President **Pamela Luster**. "Having this resource will help Mesa to make data-informed decisions, to increase student success and college effectiveness, and to put our plans into action."

Student involvement at Mesa College is so high that the college received in 2011 a commendation from the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges, Western Association of Schools and Colleges, for "student services leadership in the development of a program that provides opportunities for expanding student participation in college governance and club activities."

In the past year, Mesa College students have:

- Created and joined 38 different clubs
- Conducted a "Get Out and Vote" campaign and voter registration drives
- Participated in the college and district governance process
- Supported community campaigns to help the homeless and fight Alzheimer's disease, and walks to fight breast cancer, promote AIDs awareness and more
- Rallied against State budget cuts

ASG Advocates for Students

Nine Associated Student Government senators put to test their power to persuade during the 28th National Student Advocacy Conference in Washington, DC. The annual March conference educates student participants on the major issues that are critical to community colleges. Students also had the opportunity to meet with San Diego Congressman Scott Peters and Senator Dianne Feinstein to discuss important national, local and campus issues.

Students Join Congressional Reps to Rally against Loan Rate Increase

Representatives Scott Peters (CA-52), Juan Vargas (CA-51), and Susan Davis (CA-53) joined President Pamela Luster, SDCCD Trustee Bernie Rhinerson, professors and student leaders at San Diego Mesa College on Friday, June 21, to deliver a loud and clear message to Congress: do not double the interest rate on federally subsidized Stafford student loans. J. Walker, Associated Students Government senator and incoming president, spoke for fellow students, many of whom struggle each semester simply to pay for rising tuition and book costs.

NOTE: Inaction by Congress caused the Stafford student loans rates to rise to 6.8 percent on July 1, 2013, but Rep. Scott Peters and other supporters rallied on. On August 9, President Obama signed into law a new way of setting interest rates for federal Stafford loans. The rates will now move with the financial markets, which mean lower rates for the coming school year.

MESA STUDENTS WALK ON WATER


Members of the Mesa College Society of **Hispanic Professional Engineers (SHPE)** took top awards at the annual Walk on Water competition held in October at Southwestern College. According to Professor Morteza Mohssenzadeh, the goal of the competition is to promote fundamental scientific and engineering design principles. Students must consider three important design considerations buoyancy, stability, and propulsion — in the design, construction and piloting of water shoes across a swimming pool. Mesa's "Tanker SHPE" bested eight university, high school and community college teams to place in all award categories: fastest shoes, most creative shoes, and best use of recycled materials.

MAKING A WORLDWIDE MARK ON STUDENT SUCCESS

As a Fulbright scholar, Professor of Chemistry Dr. Saloua Saidane planned to spend her yearlong sabbatical in her native Tunisia preparing college students for success by changing their attitudes and behavior. When the Sept. 2012 terrorist attack on the US Embassy in Tunisia cancelled Fulbright grants, Prof. Saidane carried on at her own expense, teaching personal growth classes to college students, training educators, speaking at conferences and helping wherever she could. James Bullock, US Embassy of Tunisia, summarizes her contributions, "You have done great things (in support of educational and cultural exchange between the U.S. and Tunisia) and will continue to do great things in the future."

MESA'S WOMAN OF VISION

In July, Los Angeles public television powerhouse KCET released the names of seven Southern California women with vision: women that have spent their lifetimes working for true social justice and the betterment of their community through literature, poetry, and the arts. Among them was Mesa's own **Alessandra Moctezuma**. To quote writer Mike Sonksen: "Moctezuma has given hundreds of young artists their first art shows or public displays of their work in Los Angeles, New York, and San Diego. Her versatility as gallery director and professor has helped Mesa College develop one of the finest art and gallery studies programs in the nation."





Led by student services staff, the college responded with decorations, games, toys and stuffed teddy bears, and a \$275 cash donation.

HONORS STUDENTS WIN PRESTIGIOUS SCHOLARSHIPS



Two Mesa College honor students were among 73 in the nation to receive prestigious 2013 Jack Kent Cooke undergraduate scholarships worth up to \$30,000 per year.

Kiet Lam, 20, faced his fear of deportation with a determination to succeed. According to Dr. Alison Primoza, SDCCD honors transfer officer, Kiet completed a "curriculum rivaling that of a university senior." Kiet plans to study electrical engineering and computer science at UC Berkeley.

When life rendered her jobless and homeless, Tammy Schwinegruber, 43, strengthened her resolve to succeed and returned to college full-time in 2010 to pursue a new career. Tammy graduated with multiple degrees and plans to pursue a degree in chemical engineering at UC Riverside.

With the double awards in 2013, Mesa College can count seven JKC awards in seven years.

Gracia Molina de Pick Gifts \$80,000 to Mesa Chicana/o Studies



Lifelong educator, feminist, and community activist Gracia Molina de Pick was on hand in March for the 2nd Annual Gracia Molina de Pick Feminist Lecture Series. The event honored community activist Tommie Camarillo and featured a panel discussion on Chicana activism in San Diego.

The occasion also marked the signing of an \$80,000 endowment by the Pick family to Mesa's Chicana/o Studies Department. The fund will support the continued lecture series named in her honor, the expansion of programs, and create an annual student scholarship in her honor.

Mesa College will name the glass gallery exhibit space in the Humanities, Languages and Multicultural Studies Building rotunda in her honor.

MDATION FORSUCCESS,

Student Services Center

District officials, former and current college administrators, students and staff, and even the sun showed up for the February opening celebration of the new **Student Services Center**. The center was an immediate hit when it opened in fall, 2012. In January, the SSC received LEED Gold certification. Nineteen student services departments are now housed in the facility, truly a "one stop shop" for student success.





Math+Science Complex

In the center of campus, the massive Math+Science Complex rose like a Phoenix. The new 206,000 square feet project is a four-story building consisting of classrooms, lecture rooms, computer and teaching laboratories, and faculty support space. Specialty teaching spaces include a greenhouse and an astronomy observation center. Exterior teaching spaces feature globally themed micro climate gardens, including an Australian garden, a South African garden and a San Diego native species garden. Completed on time and on budget, the building opens for classes in spring semester 2014.



San Diego Mesa College Social and Behavioral Sciences Building

Study in the fields of social and behavioral sciences is poised to reach new levels of distinction with the April groundbreaking of the new three-story, \$40.5 million building. The San Diego Mesa College Social and Behavioral Sciences Building will feature 66,000 SF of "smart" classrooms; Psychology, Anthropology and Geography laboratories; and Communications Studies studios. A series of courtyards will open toward and complement the future Mesa College Quad. A multi-use patio will crown the third floor of the structure, which is on track to obtain LEED Gold certification from the United States Green Building Council (USGBC).



CE at Mesa College Campus

The campus and community welcomed the opening of the \$22.5 million Continuing Education Mesa College **Campus**. The new two-story building consolidates programs formerly held at nearby community sites. It offers English as a second language and parent education programs, as well as disability support services and enrichment programs for seniors.






