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

What do we expect when we see a life size, ornately framed, full length portrait of a powerful looking figure? Typically, one would think that it was a European Old Master painting of a wealthy or royal Caucasian sitter. By drawing upon the visual language of historical paintings, but inserting contemporary African American subjects into his compositions, Kehinde Wiley turns these assumptions on their heads. As he has stated, "Generally I try to create a place of disorientation, as a way to upset the natural balance that the viewer may have when they look at one of my images. What I love in art is that it takes known combinations and reorders them in a way that sheds light on something that they have never seen before or allows them to consider the world in a slightly different way."

Thus, by juxtaposing contemporary urban figures with the style and scale of the Renaissance, Baroque and Rococo periods, Wiley bestows the power and authority of Eurocentric Western painting onto his anonymous models who emphasize black masculinity and strength.

The titles and poses of Wiley's paintings are typically culled from specific art historical precedents. In this case, his inspiration was a 15th century stained glass window depicting Philip IV of France. The king was infamously nicknamed "the fair," as a description of his appearance as well as an ironic allusion to his treacherous reign.
