### 2. Physical Therapist Assistant Program (PTA): Amanda Johnston

#### Outcomes Assessed:

- 3 assessment tools to assess all 6 Program Outcomes
  - The Clinical Performance Instrument (CPI) is a national tool that all
     PTA and PT programs utilize for assessment purposes. -
  - The second assessment tool used is the National Licensure Examination(NLE) pass rate
  - The third assessment tool is the California Law and Regulations examination. Student must pass this to work as a PTA in California.
- Also use individual courses to assess the first PLO specific to course involved interventions.

#### > Schedule for Assessment:

Generally assess in the fall semester

#### Results:

- In 2018, 100% of the graduates reached overall entry level on the CPI
- In 2019, 95% pass rate and the one student is retaking the assessment

- Embedding tutoring in classes
- Creating a student-driven care seminar
- Review curriculum
- Increase student preparedness for DCP and employment.

# 2. Pathways 4th Pillar: Ensure Learning: what is COA's, Responsibility: Michelle Toni Parsons

- The Pathways work is in early stages
- PLOs should be integrated into the Pathway mapping as well as skills that students will gain. How are we ensuring the learning of students?
- Mapping should also include career skills
- PLOs and CLOs will be integrated into Pathways mapping
- Ensuring learning in the classroom and ensuring learning outside of the classroom and what that looks like, because it is all-inclusive.
- Currently ILO assessment is done at the beginning of a student's Mesa experience and at the end. Pathways is the mindset of what is happening in the middle—why are we losing students?
- Where should we put assessment pieces along the way?
- The momentum points in a student's journey are important; thus, such assessment is such a great tool.
- Meta majors: the idea that students are on boarded and graduated by areas of interest. The student may not know exactly what major to pursue but can be guided to a broader interest.
