	Our call to action is two-fold:	
	 Career Peer Ambassador Team: A workshop series was created and placed in as many Black Studies courses and special programs as possible. 108 students participated. A low number of Black student attended. We will keep thinking about how to improve this. The Career Coordinators will bring career workshops to Black Studies and programs, for example. A panel for Black professionals is planned. 	
	 Transfer, Career, and Evaluations: The teams have come together to create a unified plan to make Black students feel welcome and supported in the TCE space. TCE will partner with other departments to recruit and retain Black students. We will use intentional outreach and incorporate student voice.

	 We want to increase the number of Black students in EOPS who achieve 	
	their goals. We did increase numbers from 18-19 and 19-20.

	 Our goal is to support Black students in asking for and receiving mental health services. This is critically important for Black students because of th trauma they have experienced throughout their lives related to race and racism in the US. 	

 We want to offer culturally relevant care and options for therapy. Although we have two African American therapists, we are pursuing a community-based program to meet students where they are – within their communities where they feel safer and more at home. This community-based group will consult with SHS to strengthen our campus program.
 Regional Strong Workforce Marketing Completion Project See presentation Mesa received \$50,000 to help support students in getting to the finish line. Equity is foremost in this project. The project has focused on students in business and economics degree programs. Data: The project considered 640 students who were close to completion but had not received a degree due to many factors.
 Disproportionate impacts were identified. Counselors Rico and Marrujo added qualitative data and the group coded it. Category One: 158 students were ready to graduate. Category Two: 58 students needed to reapply to graduate. Category Three: 417 students were missing a class or two or needed a different ed plan.
 Interventions & Re-engagement A Constant Contact Email Campaign Apply to Graduate Parties initiative – these were very successful. As an incentive, coordinators included an opportunity drawing during the party and career information. Students loved it. For students in the third category, a short meeting with a counselor to look at ed plans and make necessary changes. The team continued drilling down to look more closely at race/ethnicity and gender relative to graduation status (ready to graduate; need to reapply; missing classes or need a different ed plan) Preliminary Recommendations Inform students of value of earning an associate degree, specifically for diproportionately impacted students.
 for disproportionately impacted students. Provide more education and communications with students and faculty. Create better mapping, so students know where they are in their journey. This would help to keep them on track. Award degrees automatically. Next Steps We will look at those who've applied to graduate, continue to hold Apply to Graduation Parties, and begin phone outreach. We received a second round of funding which begins January 2021.

- Student Affairs: Hunger and Homeless Week has been amazing. Warm and Fuzzy has been an outstanding distribution event, that included blankets, goodies and \$50 gift cards. When we return from Thanksgiving, scholarships will be available! The deadline will now be due in March! We've had 25 <u>All-USA PTK scholarship applications</u> this year.
- AS: The AS is hosting a Blast from the Past event featuring AS alums to share news of life after Mesa. They will hold this event in January.
- Financial Aid: Thanks to all who supported the Osher Scholarship process in which 500 eligible students applied. We went live with 4,635 emails to eligible students who can apply for an automated loan. Students have the option to accept or decline the loan and take other steps to receive this money. - Outreach & Promise: Coffee Hours has been amazing. Thanks to TCE for your partnerships. We're inviting early HS graduates to apply. We have 180 students on our interest list. Thanks to Agustin for his work on Winter CRUISE so all Promise students can attend! Outreach is hosting a virtual outreach desk. Students want a Reg Fest. We will be hosting a mini-Reg Fest. Students are ready for Spring, but need to know what to do.
- Student Health Services: SHS has been working feverishly on COVID-19 cases. Please be safe. *Be Calm* is held twice a week now. This and other groups help students feel less isolated.
- Testing & Assessment: Assessment is doing great work with Kearny students to help them get started strong. The Call to Action infographics are coming along really well.
