2014 Graduating Student Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILO) Survey Results (June 2014)

Background and Methodology

As part of its comprehensive learning outcomes assessment plan, San Diego Mesa College conducted an Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILO) assessment in Spring 2013. A survey was designed and administered to spring graduates to assess student perception of learning and growth in each of the six ILOs. Two questions were created for each of the six ILOs, based upon each ILO's operational definition. Findings from the survey were then vetted through multiple venues, including workshops conducted in conjunction with Fall 2013 convocation, meetings of the Learning Assessment Task Force, the Planning and Institutional Effectiveness Committee, and other groups. Analysis of feedback from the vetting process led the Learning Assessment Task Force to make two recommendations for 2013-2014: (a) the College should revisit the operational definitions of its ILOs, which were created in 2003-2004, for relevancy and clarity with current practice; and (b) survey design should be revised to provide more meaningful feedback to the College.

The Learning Assessment Task Force initiated work to revise operational definitions of the six ILOs in late Fall 2013. A draft of the new operational definitions was vetted with both senates and then approved by the task force and forwarded to the Planning and Institutional Effectiveness Committee for review. The new operational definitions were recommended by the President's Cabinet and ultimately approved by the President in April 2014.

Based upon the new operational definitions and utilizing a revised survey design, the Office of Institutional Effectiveness drafted new survey items. The survey was administered via the internet to students who applied for graduation at Mesa College. The goal of the survey was to assess students' perceptions of their learning experience at Mesa College, as well as to gather self-assessment data related to the College's six Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs). Mesa College's six ILOs include the following:

- Critical Thinking
- Global Awareness
- Personal Awareness
- Self-Awareness
- Communication
- Technological Awareness

The survey included 28 Likert scale items, intended to assess students' perceived mastery of the six ILOs. In addition, the survey included two open-ended items that asked students to identify their most valuable learning experiences at Mesa College and provide suggestions for changes or improvements to promote better learning experiences for the future. A copy of the survey instrument can be found in Appendix A. Internal consistency analyses were conducted for each of the six sets of ILO items. All ILO scales had internal Cronbach's Alpha values of .80 or above (see Appendix B).

Invitations to complete the survey were sent out via email to 868 students who applied for graduation from Mesa College with an associate degree and/or certificate. Survey respondents were also given the opportunity to submit their name in a drawing for a \$50 Amazon gift card as an incentive to complete the survey. A total of 224 students responded to the survey; however, only 216 completed the survey, for a response rate of 25%.

Results

The results of the survey are summarized in the following sections, and a distribution and averages to all survey items can be found in Appendix C.

▶ Participants






Figure 1. Anticipated Graduation Semester

Participants included 216 Mesa College students, contacted via e-mail, who had registered for upcoming graduation. For descriptive purposes, respondents were asked to identify their anticipated graduation term. The majority of survey respondents reported that they were graduating in Spring 2014 (94%). The remaining students reported that they were planning to graduate in upcoming semesters: seven students (3%) in summer 2014, four students (2%) in Fall 2012, and two students (1%) in spring 2015 (see Figure 1).

Due to the specific focus of this survey research, the subsequent demographics and learning outcome results pertain to the Spring 2014 graduates (N=202) only.

Survey participants were also asked what type of educational award they anticipated receiving upon graduation. Most students reported that they would be graduating solely with an Associate's degree (77%), while a small minority (7%) reported that they were graduating solely with a Certificate. Furthermore,16% of respondents indicated that they were graduating with a Certificate in addition to an Associate's degree (see Figure 2).





Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILO) Assessment

Students were asked to assess their skill and ability improvement in six areas that aligned with the College's Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs). This portion of the survey contained 28 items intended to measure the six ILOs: Critical Thinking (6 items), Global Awareness (4 items), Personal Awareness (7 items), Self-Awareness (4 items), Communication (4 items), and Technological Awareness (3 items).

At the beginning of each question section, students were prompted with the phrase "My experiences at Mesa College improved my ability to..." Participants then responded to items related to each of the ILO constructs, and skill improvement was measured using a Likert scale from 1 (*Not at all*) to 5 (*To a great degree*). Items for each ILO were presented in a randomized order in the survey across several sections.




Figure 3. Average Reported Skill Improvement Ratings for Each ILO Area

Skill improvement scores were calculated by averaging the subset of items for each ILO. Overall, the improvement scores for each of the ILOs were above the midpoint of the scale (range: 3.85 to 4.06), indicating that students felt that their skills in these areas increased more than a moderate amount in each ILO area (see Figure 3). Responses to specific survey items are summarized in the following sections by ILO.

Critical Thinking Learning Outcome

The six items pertaining to the Critical Thinking ILO addressed various analytical skills with academic and real-world applications, including the abilities to analyze and evaluate sources of information, to use evidence effectively, to summarize and share material in a coherent manner, and general problem-solving.




Figure 4. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Critical Thinking ILO Items

Among the six ILOs, respondents reported that they had the greatest improvement in Critical Thinking. Across the six Critical Thinking items, respondents provided the highest improvement ratings for drawing their own conclusions based on available evidence and lowest improvement ratings for applying principles learned from their classes to solve real-world problems (see Figure 4).

Global Awareness Learning Outcome




Figure 5. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Global Awareness ILO Items

The Global Awareness ILO included four items that emphasized cultural sensitivity and competency, civility, and awareness of the impact that humans have on the world's resources. Among the Global Awareness items, respondents provided the highest improvement ratings for acting with civility towards others even if they disagreed with them, and the lowest improvement ratings for assessing the impact of human behavior on the world's resources (see Figure 5).

Personal Awareness Learning Outcome

The seven items related to the Personal Awareness ILO emphasized personal responsibility, goal setting, and healthy lifestyle choices. The Personal Awareness ILO items were intended to assess whether students had improved their skills and abilities in the following areas: goal-setting, teamwork, taking initiative, and making healthy choices.




Figure 6. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Personal Awareness ILO Items

Among the Personal Awareness items, respondents provided higher improvement ratings for both personal and career goal setting but notably lower improvement ratings for understanding their personal impact on others, making healthy choices, and identifying their role in society (see Figure 6).

Self-Awareness Learning Outcome




Figure 7. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Self-Awareness ILO Items

The Self-Awareness ILO was measured using four items focusing on collaboration skills and developing relationships with others. Improvement ratings for Self-Awareness items were split between the building relationships items and teamwork items (see Figure 7). Respondents provided higher improvement ratings for working as an effective member of a team and collaborating with others than for developing relationships with instructors and other students.

Communication Learning Outcome




Figure 8. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Communication ILO Items

Four items were used to assess the Communication ILO, which was defined as the ability to effectively present information in speech, written, or visual forms. Among the Communication-specific items, respondents provided the highest improvement ratings for the ability to analyze written information and the lowest improvement ratings for analyzing visual materials, such as graphics, charts, or art forms (see Figure 8).

Technological Awareness Learning Outcome

The Technological Awareness ILO was measured using three items. These items included using technology as a learning tool, ability to identify technological weaknesses, and using technology for effective communication purposes.




Figure 9. Average Skill Improvement Ratings for Technological Awareness ILO Items

Technological Awareness had the lowest average skill improvement ratings of the six ILOs. Among the Technological Awareness items, respondents provided the highest improvement ratings for utilizing technology to enhance their learning and the lowest improvement ratings for identifying areas to improve their technology skills (see Figure 9).

Most Important Learning Experience of Spring 2014 Mesa College Graduates

Respondents were asked to identity the most important thing they learned during their experience as a Mesa College student. A total of 147 Spring 2014 graduates responded to this question. Verbatim responses to this item are included in Appendix B.

Although responses to this item covered a wide range of topics, several themes emerged from the responses, including the following skills, abilities, and realizations:

- Time management skills
- Communication skills, communicating effectively with people from diverse backgrounds
- Hard work, discipline, and dedication lead to positive outcomes
- Self-reliance
- Self-efficacy and confidence
- Effectively working as a member of a team: collaboration
- Setting and achieving personal, educational, and/or professional goals
- Resilience: overcoming adversity, staying focused on goals instead of obstacles
- Openness to other perspectives, cultures, and worldviews

• Graduating Student Recommendations to Improve the College Learning Experience

Lastly, survey participants were asked what Mesa College could do to improve their learning experience. A total of 145 Spring 2014 graduates responded to this item. Verbatim responses to this item are included in Appendix B. A number of common themes emerged from the responses, including the following:

- Campus facilities and learning environments
 - o Increase parking capacity/improve parking situation
 - o Expand and modernize facilities
 - Alleviate issues caused by campus construction projects (noise, detours)
- Improve technology infrastructure
 - Modernize instructional technology
 - o Maintain industry-standard software applications and instructional technology
 - o Increase wifi bandwith/capacity
- Improve college resources to support student success
 - o Expand access to educational planning, advising, and counseling services
 - Provide additional tutoring options
 - o Improve consistency and accuracy of information provided by counseling department
- Expand access to classes
 - o Restore summer term
 - Provide additional online course options
 - Provide additional scheduling options (day, evening) for core courses
 - Improve consistency in quality of instruction
- Provide additional opportunities for student interaction
 - o Campus events
 - o Networking
 - Extracurricular activities
 - o Improved communication to the campus community
 - o Interaction during class activities

It is important to note that a substantial number of students mentioned that nothing was needed to improve their learning experience at Mesa College. Several other respondents also used this item to provide positive feedback about their experiences.

Conclusions and Recommendations

The present study was intended to assess students' perceived mastery of Mesa College's ILOs: Communication, Critical Thinking, Global Awareness, Personal Awareness, Self-Awareness, and Technological Awareness. Several survey items were developed for each ILO based on the College's ILO operational definitions, and a survey was administered online to students who applied for graduation from Mesa College in Spring 2014. A total of 202 Spring 2014 graduates and 14 students who expected to graduate in a subsequent term completed the survey, for a response rate of 25%. The survey data analysis focused on Spring 2014 graduates only.

As a whole, survey respondents generally felt that their learning experience had positively impacted their abilities and skills in each of the six ILO areas. Of these six areas, respondents indicated they had the greatest improvement in Critical Thinking. The Personal Awareness ILO, along with Communication, had the second highest average rating for skill improvement. Though the average Global Awareness ILO and Self-Awareness ILO scores were in the middle of the score range for the six ILOs, qualitative data from the open-ended responses suggest that students felt that some of their most poignant learning experiences pertained to these learning outcome areas. Specifically, students cited the following as their most important learning experiences: perseverance, resilience, self-efficacy, time management, teamwork, and interpersonal communication. The ILO with the lowest average skill improvement scores was Technological Awareness.

Students also provided a variety of recommendations for improving learning experiences, including improvements in the following areas: campus facilities and learning environments, technology, college resources and support services, access to classes, and opportunities for interaction. It should be noted

that many students also utilized this survey item as an opportunity to express satisfaction and gratitude for the excellent instruction or overall experience they had at Mesa College.

The findings of the present survey are consistent with those of previous studies conducted at Mesa College. For example, data collected via focus groups conducted for the College's educational master plan revealed the need for a stronger sense of community on campus, a more robust technological infrastructure, and the an effort to maintain a variety of course offerings in terms of content, modality, and scheduling. Additionally respondents in both the present survey and the educational master plan focus groups mentioned the need for expanded access to advising services and more consistent information provided during counseling sessions.

It should be noted that the present study, as in any study, included a number of limitations. First and foremost, just one in four students who were invited to participate in the survey actually went on to complete the survey. In addition, survey participation was completely voluntary, meaning survey results may not necessarily be representative of all Mesa College graduates. In addition, this represents the first deployment of the scale items intended to assess each of the College's ILOs per the revised ILO operational definitions. Further studies are needed in order to refine the scale and improve it for future iterations of the ILO assessment process. Thus, the survey results outlined in this report should be interpreted with a degree of caution.

Finally, the ILO survey is a self-reported, indirect measure of student learning outcomes. It is part of the College's multiple measures assessment plan, including SLO-ILO mapping and analysis and other direct assessment methods.

I felt that they did care and would not hesitate to offer assistance especially my counselors.
- I highly suggest making the education plan someone that students can access at any time ONLINE. This will allow students to keep on-tract and realize what things they still need to do to complete their degree. Making this education plan automatic after being accepted for a major would be greatly beneficial instead of having to apply for it. It would also keep the amount of students in the counseling offices down to those that have problems. State and UC schools already do this, it would help if community colleges did as well.
- I really enjoyed nearly all of the classes I completed at Mesa college. Some of them were much more difficult than I thought they would be, but I don't want to blame anyone besides myself for the challenges I faced. If anything can be fixed in colleges these days it's job placement for graduates. There was a job fair, but it didn't help me find any work because all of the jobs were online applications and the job fair felt unhelpful and very dissapointing,
- I think it would have been helpful if admission to my program had been selective rather than first-comefirst served and involved an interview assessing the applicants suitability.
- I think mesa needs to find more ways to get students to feel like they are apart of a community because it is hard to get to know people you are taking classes with even though they all have the same major. Maybe by having events for those who are all working to reach the same goal, the same associates degree or certificate.
- I think some of the professors should realize there are students who need to be engaged more in class as they learn fast and not let them be bored while other students are going off topic a lot. That has happened to me in my ANTH class a lot.

- I was denied financial aid the last two semesters because I was over my credit limits. I find this makes it extremely hard for students to finish when they are losing their financial support so close to the end and near graduation. This hinders many students. When assessing these credits, Physical Education classes should not be considered, because many students take these classes as extra curricular activities. Also, classes taken over five or ten years ago should also not be considered as part of the credits that are counted regarding financial aid. I have PE credits that I acquired when I was six to ten years old taking swimming lessons at the local community college that counted against me when I was being considered for financial aid. This policy should be reassesd.
- I was not at mesa long enough to give an accurate judgement of this, however having interactive learning programs to help tutor people would be good.
- I wish I had become involved in PTK earlier in my Mesa college experience and wish I had known about the honors program before I had so many units it did not matter any longer.

- Instead of wasting time and money writing parking tickets, Mesa College could spend their time and money on making more parking spots for students so that it can be a more stress free experience and parking wouldn't be such a hassle for future students. Also, the prices for textbooks should be drastically reduced or the availability of textbooks in the LRC should be more flexible for students who aren't able to afford them. For example, checking out text books like checking out any other book and being able to take it home would be of tremendous help and aid in the success of students greatly. I know that if I was able to check out a text book and take it home I would have done significantly better in half my classes that I was unable to afford the book in. The addition of microwaves in the LRC (first floor) and the Student Services Building (4th floor) would be the best addition to campus. It is very unfortunate that they are only located in the cafe and c-store. It is very inconvenient to have to walk ALL the way across campus if I have class in the modular village and am in between classes. It is imperative for students to eat throughout the day. Some students have very long days because they can only come or want to come 2 days a week to save gas and have time for other obligations such as work, kids, and life as it comes. Having more microwaves would enable students to eat while in between classes, but it won't help if we have to continue to inconveniently trek across campus just to heat up food and make it to class on time. It adds more stress and doesn't allow students to revive themselves with a snack in between classes.

- Mesa College should make student-teacher surveys easier to fill out, such as making them online like this survey. Also, the professor who is being critiqued should not have the power to choose which class fill out the survey. That makes the data bias since the professor will most likely pick a class where s/he would receive the most favorable views, especially if s/he is not a popular professor among the student body. The class which gets to review the professor should be picked randomly or in the case of an online survey, every student who is taking the class should be given the option to fill out the survey. With the birth of the MS building, Mesa should have also done a better job predicting the amount of students and staff accessing the WiFi. Even the WiFI in the LRC became slow, which was not a problem last semester when the MS building was under construction. The criteria for becoming a tutor should be higher as well and they should be given more time per student, especially those helping in tougher subjects. The tutors tend to spit out a formula and an answer off the top of their head and they are unable to explain it well due to time constraints. Therefore, students in lower level classes feel like they received adequate help since those subjects are easier to explain while students in higher level classes, who need tutors may feel like they wasted their time since the tutors are either unqualified or unable to fully explain the concept being asked. If it has not been implemented, there should be academic incentives in place to get more students interested in tutoring. Students who can make \$15-\$30 an hour tutoring outside of school would be less likely to volunteer time tutoring at the tutoring center. Other than that, Mesa College gave the feel of a collegiate community with the quality of most instructors present and it has adequate resources which enable the majority of the student body to succeed and achieve their goals.
