Direct or Indirect?

Data-collection methods for assessment purposes typically fall into two categories: direct and indirect. Direct evidence comes in the form of a student product or performance that can be evaluated. Indirect evidence is the perception, opinion, or attitude of students (or others). Both are important, but indirect evidence by itself is insufficient. Ideally, a program collects both types.
