

Letter from the President

This has been a historic year for Mesa College. In May of 2018, we awarded our first Bachelor of Science degrees in Health Information Management (HIM) to fifteen students. We also graduated our first San Diego Promise students. Started in 2016, the San Diego Promise Program provides free tuition for two years to first time, full time students college students – and in 2018, we are now serving over 900 students at Mesa College, and over 2,000 district–wide.

For the first time in 25 years, the #3 ranked San Diego Mesa College Football Olympians (8-2, 4-1 in the American Conference) hosted and won the Southern California Bowl in November 2017. Many other Olympian student-athletes played with skill and sportsmanship this year, representing 21 men's and women's athletic teams, winning state and national honors, and earning playoff appearances. Several teams earned Pacific Coast Athletic Conference titles, Women's Soccer, Women's Water Polo, Men's and Women's' Swim and Dive, and Men and Women's Track and Field. Our teams in Speech and Debate traveled to Montreal this year and took national honors. Students were able to present at national conferences for STEM fields as well as conduct undergraduate research as part of several college programs such as Honors, Bridges to Baccalaureate, Mesa College Research Conference and many more. All of which is to say...Mesa College students are standouts...on campus, in the community and in the world.

Taking a Stand Against Hunger continues to be one of the central efforts of our work. Participating and partnering with Feeding San Diego, the college expanded to offer a free farmers market – which is now held monthly. In addition to The Stand, the college food and clothing pantry, these sustained efforts are making a difference for our students. The college is laser focused on removing barriers to student success, including exploring reductions to text book costs through open source academic materials. Our Financial Literacy Series took full flight, and we offered our students expert led workshops to keep them on track and increase their ability to maintain good financial practices.

This year, we celebrated the 20th Anniversary of the Scholarship Awards Ceremony where we awarded nearly a quarter of a million dollars in scholarships to deserving students.

We toasted the 25th Anniversary of our Learning Resource Center, which kicked off a campus renaissance and continues to adapt and grow to meet the needs of our students. We spent last year navigating the fencing around the last 2 building projects under Prop S&N, the Center for Business Technology and The Fine Arts I-300 remodel. Those buildings will open in 2019. We look forward to seeing the center of campus re-open and the refreshing of other spaces as we draw this bond work to a close...for now.

Our annual Canyon Day Clean-up event has been going strong for ten years. With over 100 campus and community volunteers annually, the event embodies our environmental commitment not only to the Mesa, but to the larger community where we reside. We held 2 successful President's Breakfasts, an opportunity to meet with business, industry, education, community and nonprofit neighbors and partners. These convenings focus on facets of Mesa College and offer the opportunity to improve our commitment to our community. We added over 40 new employees to the college this year, faculty, staff and administrators committed to our vision.

The Stand and the Farmer's Market

The Stand at Mesa College continues to build upon the College's equity efforts to decrease the effects of poverty, hunger and homelessness for students on campus. "The Stand" – a food pantry and clothing closet that assists students impacted by a lack of food and clothing resources, opened in February of 2017 and continues to provide resources for students. During the 2017–18 academic year, The Stand has provided 18,853 food items to 894 students, and 1995 items of clothing to 214 students.

In April 2018, San Diego Mesa College successfully debuted "The Stand: Farmer's Market", created via a new partnership with Feeding San Diego. The Stand: Farmers Market offered students and members of the Mesa College community access

to free food, consisting of a variety of fresh produce. The initiative is part of Mesa College's effort on "Taking a Stand Against Hunger." Over 700 students and community members attended the inaugural event, and over 8,000 lbs. of fresh food were distributed. Based on the success of the first event, Mesa College committed to holding the event every month, and requested additional fresh produce. In total, The Farmers Markets held in April, May and June of 2018 were able to provide over 18,000 pounds of fresh produce to over 1,400 households. The Farmers Market also provides additional campus resources for students, such as Cal Fresh enrollment and 211 San Diego.

Mesa College and the San Diego Foundation Offered \$5,000 STEM Stipends to Students


In February 2018, Mesa College and San Diego Mesa College Foundation announced a unique partnership with The San Diego Foundation that provided stipends up to \$5,000 for 13 Mesa College students during the spring semester. The program, called STEM Community Scholars also, provided funds for an additional 35 selected students to participate in a series of activities that included free off-campus field trips designed to encourage them to explore careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math). The STEM Community Scholars program encouraged students to take on leadership roles, engage in community service, and enrich their learning through participation in extracurricular activities.



Mesa Supports our DACA Students

In September 2017, the San Diego Community College District and Mesa College reaffirmed their support of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program, which provides educational support for young people who were brought to this country as children. As a public institution of higher education, Mesa College works diligently to ensure that all students have full access to our institutions and are protected from pressures and intrusive actions that would disrupt or impair their education. As part of the affirmation, Mesa offered and provided multiple resources for our DACA and other impacted students, including a resource fair, peer support, advocacy workshops, and counseling sessions. In addition, Mesa hosted legal workshops on campus and provided access and information about financial resources, including the Mission Asset Fund, which provided scholarships for DACA recipients to safely renew their status.





Author and Mesa College Professor Lisa Shapiro Keynote Speaker at SDSU's Annual War Memorial Ceremony

On Friday, October 20, San Diego State University (SDSU) hosted their 21st Annual War Memorial Ceremony to honor veterans who died while serving in World War II, Korea and Vietnam. Author and San Diego Mesa College Professor Lisa Shapiro was the keynote speaker at this year's ceremony.

Shapiro had the opportunity to research and read the late SDSU professor Dr. Lauren Post's collection of letters known as the World War II Servicemen's Correspondence Collection 1941-1945. This, in addition to her personal quest to better understand her students who are veterans—and to help them in their transition to civilian life—led Shapiro to research and write her book, No Forgotten Fronts: From Classrooms to Combat.

The book includes detailed insight to the WWII letter collection, and is available at Warwick's, Barnes & Noble, and Costco.

Helena Almassy graduated in 2017 from San Diego Mesa College. That same year, she was awarded the 3CSN Learning Assistance Project Tutor of the Year Award at Tutor Expo. From there, she started to focus on helping students with Spanish and Math in a one-on-one setting, and then grew to spending time educating larger crowds. She is currently in her second year at UCSD, working as a Professional Tutor in the Tutoring Center.



During her time at Mesa, Natchel Bello Luna truly embodied the Olympian Spirit. Her service and passion for improving conditions for undocumented students at Mesa speaks for itself through her activities as Lead Peer Navigator for Mesa's CRUISE Program and as Co-President of Mesa's RISE Club. In March 2018, she received the California State Assembly's 80th District 2018 Woman of the Year award in March. In addition, Natchel received the AHSIE Seed to Tree Scholarship 2018, the Chancellor's Scholarship 2017, and the Certificate of Leadership for organizing "A Week in Our Shoes" – an event at Mesa to highlight the immigration and education struggles that undocumented students face. At the 25th Annual Scholarship Awards, Ms. Bello received three scholarships: the Chicana/o Studies Department Richard and Gracia Molina De Pick Scholarship, the Sin Fronteras Scholarship and the honorable President's Academic Excellence and Service Scholarship.

Having grown up in San Diego, she has experienced first-hand the struggles of a first generation, low income, DACA student, and continues to support the Clean Dream Act and work tirelessly towards encouraging others to show the same support. She graduated from Mesa College in May 2018 as a Business major with an emphasis in Marketing, and transferred to San Diego State University in fall 2018.



Mesa College Swimmer Samantha Schmidt Wins 2018 Super Star Award

In 2018, Mesa swimmer Samantha Schmidt was awarded the Super Star Award for her dedication to - and passion for - both her academics and sports life. The Super Star Award is given annually, and reserved for an Olympian student-athlete who demonstrates scholastic and athletic excellence, leadership, community involvement, inspiration, and team spirit. While maintaining an impressive 4.0 grade point average through the Fall 2017 season, Schmidt is an All-American Athlete who has broken Mesa College's all-time records, holds multiple medals, and won the Waterman Pentathlon - beating out 68 other competitors. She has also spent her personal time volunteering through the YMCA Raintree Ranch Camp and participated in the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and Pacific South Coast Walk for MS as a Team Leader where she raised over \$4,000 in donations. Schmidt has made Mesa proud, and she will continue to do the same when she transfers to San Diego State University in fall 2019.

The San Diego Promise Expands and Thrives at Mesa College

This year, Mesa College hosted a press conference where the SDCCD announced a major expansion of its tuition-free program known as the San Diego Promise, which allows all recent eligible high school graduates who are first time, full-time students to receive two free years of college. The event was attended by San Diego Mayor Kevin Faulconer, Chancellor Constance Carroll, Maria Nieto Senour, President of the Board of Trustees, and Cindy Marten, Superintendent of Public Education with the San Diego Unified School District, who all praised the program.

To qualify, students must be a California resident or have attended a California high school for three years, have earned a high school diploma in June 2017 or later, be a first-time college student, enroll in at least 12 units, and have completed a FAFSA or Dream Act application.

Launched as a pilot program in 2016-17 with 186 students, the San Diego Promise expanded in 2017-18 to include 661 students, nearly half of whom attend Mesa. During the first two years, the San Diego Promise demonstrated positive outcomes, with 19 percent of Promise students earning a 4.0 GPA this past year. Several San Diego Promise students who graduated in May transferred to UC San Diego, San Diego State University, and other four-year colleges and universities.

With the implementation of Assembly Bill 19 (Santiago) and a district-led fundraising campaign, the district estimates 3,500 or more students may benefit from the San Diego Promise in the 2018-19 academic year.

20th Anniversary of the Learning Resource Center (LRC)

San Diego Mesa College celebrated the 20th Anniversary of the Learning Resource Center (LRC) in April of 2018. The historic event was attended by nearly 200 current and former faculty, staff administrators students sand members of the community. Completed in 1998, the Learning Resource Center provides more than 100,000 SF of space for Mesa College's Library, Independent Learning Center, and associated spaces. Poised at the edge of the canyon in the center of the campus, the LRC building was the largest single facility developed by the California Community College System at that time.

The Mesa College Learning Resource Center continues to be the vibrant place of learning that it was intended to be. Historically, libraries only offered books, but the Mesa College Learning Resource Center offers tutoring, specialized study areas, a writing center, a STEM Center, computer labs, accessible artwork, professional development spaces and even a Smart Mart.

San Diego Mesa College Kicked Off the Fine Arts Building Project

Over 100 attendees participated in the Mesa College start-of-construction event for the future of the Fine Arts Building (I-300), where they had the chance to contribute to two commemorative art murals. The new Fine-Arts building is being constructed within an existing building on campus. With four-stories and 26,500 square feet, it will be a highly visible and thriving hub for Fine Arts students. The building, funded by Propositions S and N, will have features like light colored roofing material with high reflective values, CO2 sensors, modernized facilities, equipment for programs in drawing, painting, photography, sculpting and ceramics, and a new space for the highly-acclaimed Mesa Art Gallery.

The World Cultures Art Collection

For the past 20 years, San Diego Mesa College has been home to San Diego's most extensive collection of African artwork, an invaluable resource that professors use to enrich students' learning and reach out into the community. This year, the museum—quality collection grew even further to include pieces from India, Southeast Asia, Oceania and Mesoamerica – which prompted the San Diego Mesa College Foundation to rename the Collection, "The World Cultures Collection". The growth of the collection was made possible by donations from several collectors in the area, including Dr. John Ross, Dr. Arvin Klein, Dr. Richard Ulevitch, and Dr. Mark Groudine. Thanks to the generosity of these donors, Mesa's collection was able to reach over 1,200 pieces. The expanded World Cultures Artwork Collection was celebrated in April of 2017 along with the 20th Anniversary of the Learning Resource Center in which the collection is housed.





San Diego Mesa College Foundation

San Diego Mesa College Foundation was founded in 1974 to support the success of Mesa students. Over the years, the Foundation has joined with faculty, staff, alumni, and other friends of Mesa College to garner resources and respond to student and campus needs. In June, the GeoTech Center hosted Case and other selected students at the GeoEd '18 Workshops to be held in Louisville, KY on the Southwest Campus of Jefferson Community and Technical College. Among the several student submissions they received, Case was chosen as the second place winner among community and technical colleges and chosen as the winner of the use of open source software.

Case has a strong interest in archaeology and how the, "utilization of new technology to document and preserve archaeological data" could allow archaeologists to complete their work without facing barriers like financial costs or time conflicts. His previous education – an Associate of Arts in Anthropology from Mesa, and his Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology from SDSU – have served him well in creating an academic foundation for his career goals that are tying in to his GIS studies.

This past year, Mesa College fully committed to engaging Guided Pathways, a framework designed to improve outcomes by offering clear completion and career pathways and integrated support services for our students. We sent a team of faculty, classified professionals and administrators to a IEPI Guided Pathways Workshop in October 2017. We engaged the campus through open forums, online reviews, public input, retreats and presentations to complete our Self-Assessment in December 2017. In March 2018, we completed a Multi-Year Work Plan and formed the Mesa Pathways Committee (MPC). MPC will use an integrated, equity-minded, student-centered approach to facilitate student success, and we will work to close equity gaps, improve student outcomes and guide students into and through college to the completion of personal, academic and professional goals.
