cademic Excellence ...by the Numbers

Amid reports of rising tuitions and mounting student loan debts, it's no surprise that most of the fastest-growing colleges in America — and San Diego — are public institutions. San Diego Mesa College has been recognized by *Community College Week* magazine as the fastest growing college in the State, and the seventh fastest growing in the nation. With a 13 percent increase in enrollment, Mesa College ranked the highest growth in numbers in the state of California. Of 1,050 two-year institutions nationwide, the magazine's overall ranking puts Mesa College seventh in the country for colleges enrolling 10,000 students or more. Mesa (7) and its sister institution, Miramar College (41), were two of only four California community colleges to place in the top 50 with enrollments of 10,000 or more.

- Mesa College remains one of California's top transfer community colleges, with transfer rate of 44% and a transfer-prepared rate of 51%. In 2010-2012, Mesa transferred 2,079 students to four-year universities.
- Reflecting the communities it serves, the college's Latino student population has grown substantially, comprising 28% of the student body in fall 2011.
- Mesa continues to maximize student access. In fall 2011, classes were filled to 95% of capacity.
- In 2011-2012, the college offered a variety of special programs aimed at improving outcomes for underrepresented students. These programs include the Mesa Academy, FAST Scholars, and Puente programs. The fruits of these efforts are evidenced by the improvement in first-time student persistence, which increased from 65% for 2006 students to 71% for fall 2010 students.

In a dozen years at Mesa College, **Ed Helscher** has been the head men's basketball coach, and taught golf, racquetball, weight training and fitness classes. Over the past year, Ed has also been the "Mesa SLO Head Coach," training Mesa College instructors on how to develop Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) for their programs and classes as well as how to record their SLOs in the campus specific software package. Ed's leadership has ensured that Mesa College is in compliance with Accreditation Proficiency Standards for Student Learning Outcomes. For his efforts, President Pam Luster presented Ed with an "Above and Beyond" award at the Fall 2012 Convocation.





New DOE Designation to Help Mesa College Serve Hispanic Students

San Diego Mesa College received official notification on April 13, 2012, that it has been designated by the Department of Education as a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI). An HSI is defined as a non-profit institution that has at least 25 percent Hispanic full-time equivalent enrollment, among other criteria. HSI standing may mean more grant funding and appropriations will be allocated to Mesa College in an effort to assist Hispanics in accomplishing their higher-education goals.

"This designation does two important things," said Pamela T. Luster, President. "First, it opens the door to grants and funding that will enable us to increase access and success for a greater number of students. Second, it brings the college recognition as a part an excellent network of colleges and universities nationwide designated as Hispanic Serving Institutions."





Spanish Professor Dr. **Leticia López** was one of only a few people chosen from across the country to receive a federal fellowship from the U.S. Department of Agriculture that focuses on colleges with Hispanic-oriented programs. During a summer session, Leticia experienced first-hand the policy making process by meeting with USDA personnel and connecting with federal agencies such as the Department of Education, Housing and Urban Development, and the National Science Foundation. "It's definitely been an engaging and eye-opening experience," reported Leticia on day two of the fellowship orientation session. "There is so much we — faculty and student advocates — came away with that in the end will help serve the needs of our campuses better."





The Mesa Experience

The Olympian spirit is at an all time high! Student involvement has grown so much through the years that the college received in 2011 a commendation from the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges, Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The Accreditation Report commended Mesa College for its "student services leadership in the development of a program that provides opportunities for expanding student participation in college governance and club activities."

ASG Advocates for Students

Associated Student Government (ASG) and the InterClub Council had a busy year advocating for students in Sacramento and, with the American Student Association of Community Colleges (ASACC), in Washington, D.C. These two advocacy efforts on behalf of all Mesa College students addressed issues such as cuts to education in California, increases in the interest rate for student loans, and cuts to Pell Grants. Students had the opportunity to march, rally, and speak with legislators, including Assemblyperson Marty Block, Senator Barbara Boxer, and the representatives of California Department of Finance. In April, the two groups attended the Student Senate of California Community College's General Assembly in Ontario. "These opportunities enable attendees to actively participate in statewide student politics," said ASG President Cherie Deogracias. "We are able to witness how decisions unfold, and how resolutions are put into place within the governing body of all 112 student governments in California."

A 2012 graduate, **Cherie Deogracias** had attended several other schools before she came to Mesa College in 2010. At Mesa, she became involved in the Honors Program, the Student Veterans Union, and ran track and field. In 2011, she was elected as head of the Associated Student Government. "At none of the other campuses I've attended have I felt that the staff and faculty were more invested in their students than at Mesa College," she said. "My professors, peers and advisors have gone above and beyond in helping me reach the next step, which will be transferring to a four-year university." Now a political science major at UCLA, Cherie hopes to eventually earn a doctorate, and dreams of working with the United Nations Economic Council.





Students Protest Budget Cuts

Hundreds of students, faculty and staff at four San Diego colleges took part in marches and rallies on the first day of March as part of what was billed as a nationwide protest against cuts in education funding. At Mesa, the student club, BEAT (Bringing Education and Activism Together) organized the effort, with more than a hundred taking part.

Krystal Monroe had dreams, but it took resilience to pursue a college education and succeed after much adversity. After finally finding a path and direction at Mesa College, the 21-year-old decided to offer a scholarship to help other students in similar situations achieve their dreams. Named for Krystal and her sister, the Krystal Rose Scholarship of \$250 was first awarded this spring to two young women who have overcome obstacles such as growing up without a father or never having the beneficial privileges of both parents throughout life. "I hope to make a positive impact and create extraordinary opportunities for women and all people who have been through similar hurts and hardships," said Krystal. "I want to be the next 'Great Pioneer."





Scholarship and Imposation

World Capitals Program

Five Mesa College students were selected to receive full scholarships valued at \$8000 each to participate in the summer World Capitals Program, sponsored by the Global Institute of Comparative Studies (GICS) at Chancellor University. **Diana Polyak**, **Tyler Wescott**, **Jacqueline Ibarra**, **Diego Manrique** and **Alexander Gonzalez** were the lucky recipients of this award. Two City College

students also received awards, with City and Mesa students representing the entire West Coast. The students embarked on an eight-week trip this summer through Berlin, Paris and Strasbourg, while completing a demanding global studies curriculum.

Ambassadors All

Student Ambassadors look like the average college student, but they are so much more. Each semester, this team of up to a dozen students acts as a link between the college, our students, and the community. During the 2011-2012 academic year, the ambassadors (pictured below) made contact with 23,632 potential Mesa students at high schools, SDCCD Continuing Education campuses, and community fairs and events. Using their own experiences, the ambassadors share personal reflections of what it is like to attend Mesa College. On campus, they reach out to current Mesa students to offer insight and information on the different services available to students, ranging from Basic Skills classes to spreading the word about the college's rigorous Honors Program.

Student ambassador **Mia Bell Pinkney** helps noncredit students solve the college equation. As a Mesa College Student Ambassador, she meets individually with students at Continuing Education who are transitioning from noncredit classes to credit classes at City, Mesa, and Miramar colleges. Mia assists Continuing Education students with important steps such as priority registration, completing admission and financial aid applications, and scheduling placement tests and orientations. Plus, she informs students about resources and programs available to them at the college campuses. This individual help is directly aligned with the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges' effort to promote and improve student success.





New Lecture Series Honors Educator/ Activist

Noted educator, reformer, community activist and feminist **Gracia Molina de Pick** was on hand to launch a new lecture series that honors her legacy on March 6. Named for the founder of the San Diego Mesa College Chicano Studies Department, the lecture series honors Molina de Pick's life-long commitment to education



and feminism, and her dedication to the mission of the community college. Education activist and 2010 Medal of Freedom recipient **Sylvia Mendez** was the inaugural speaker. She and her family fought to integrate schools in California in 1945, seven years before Brown vs. Board of Education. To a packed lecture room, Mendez shared how she continues the legacy left by her parents and her passion for learning. "I want (students) to go on get their degree.... I want them not to stop at a Bachelors," she said. "I want them to go on to a Masters." Education is Key

The message that education is the key to a better future echoed throughout the day at the sixth African-American/Latino Male Leadership Summit held in March. About 175 male students from Mesa College feeder high schools attended the event, which last year won an award from the League for Innovation.



Dr. Francisco Rodriguez, superintendent/president of MiraCosta College, told students, "Education is the key. It's all about perseverance and persistence."



Recent Mesa College graduate **Abdirisak Hussein** is one of only 60 students in the entire nation to be named a Jack Kent Cooke Scholar for 2012. (Awards for this prestigious scholarship can total up to \$30,000 per year for each student.) "Abdi" grew up in war-torn Somalia and lived as a refugee before moving to the U.S. at the age of 17. "Moving to this country and speaking little or almost no English, I knew life was going to be very challenging. Hard work, determination and surrounding myself with mentors, advisors and good friends helped me to overcome those challenges and kept me moving forward," said the East San Diego resident. Abdi now attends UCLA; and hopes someday to work for Doctors Without Borders. The JKC scholarship is the fifth in six years for San Diego Mesa College.



Art Gallery Director and Museum Studies Professor **Alessandra Moctezuma** was singled out for keeping the next generation of arts leaders coming. "(Her) former students read like a who's who of the San Diego art scene," wrote Kinsee Morlan, *SD City Beat*. Recognizable alumni include artist and freelance curator Nuvia Crisol Guerra, Ginger Rosser of the Women's Museum of California, Brynn Morales of Alexander Salazar Fine Art and staffers at the San Diego Museum of Art and other big culture venues around town. Prof. Moctezuma gives her students wide choices of opportunities to intern at museums, galleries, and wherever they can learn practical skills. "It's a way of giving back to the community," Moctezuma said. "It builds connections and becomes a natural feed for the students to end up working in those organizations."





Tympian Gold

On August 6th, Mesa graduate "Super Felix" Sanchez (1995-1997), won the 400-meter hurdles for the Dominican Republic eight years after his first Olympic triumph. His winning time of 47.63 seconds was identical to his time in Athens 2004. Sanchez was inspired and mentored by another Mesa grad, coach,



and champion, **Arnie Robinson** (see inset story below). Robinson, a 1969 Mesa graduate, two-time Olympic medalist and beloved track coach is the college's 2012 Distinguished Alumnus. Sanchez credits Robinson for much of his success.

On the same day as Sanchez's win, Mesa throws coach **Jarred Rome** competed for the discus finals. Rome threw 59.57 meters (195 feet, 4 inches), finishing 31st among 41 competitors to advance to the London Olympics.

Olympic medalist, beloved coach, and champion for youth **Arnie Robinson** is the San Diego Mesa College 2012 Distinguished Alumnus. Coach Robinson was honored at the Mesa College Commencement Ceremony on May 19th. A winner of the 1972 and 1976 Olympic Trials long jump, Robinson was third at the 1972 Olympic Games and took the gold medal in 1976. He was the 1971 Pan American Games champion and was second in 1975. A veteran of 10 international competitions, Arnie was also the first World Cup long jump champion in 1977. He won seven national long jump titles before retiring in 1979. Four years later, he was named Track and Field Coach at Mesa College and served in that capacity until his retirement in 2011. Coach Robinson remains a pillar in the track and field community and is most proud of the very active role he has played in the youth track and field.





Mesa Athletics Take Top Honors Wins Prestigious DeVore Trophy

San Diego Mesa College is the recipient of the 2011-12 Chet DeVore Trophy, the highest award a California community college athletics program can receive.

The award recognizes the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) college with the most successful men's and women's intercollegiate athletic program for the academic year. Mesa accumulated 241 points in a scoring system that rewards community college team finishes, conference team finishes, and major conference individual awards.

Ten of 20 Olympian teams took first place in each of their divisions. Four women's teams (water polo, volleyball, basketball, swim/dive) and four men's (cross country, tennis, baseball, softball) took PCAC conference championships. The men's and women's track and field teams were named Foothill College Champions, and also placed in the State Championships – third in men's cross country and eighth in men's track and field.

Individually, **Chanel Putrus** and **Matt Neault** (pictured) were named the PCAC female and male scholar-athlete for 2012. Throwing sensation **Cassandra Kennison** not only took first in the State for the shot put with a throw of 14.98m, but she also ranked as the number two female thrower in the nation for community colleges.

Dual sport head coach, **Mike Hootner** was named "Coach of the Year" for the fourth consecutive time for Men's Tennis, and earned his first "Coach the Year Award" for Women's Basketball. Also winning honors were head coach **Renee Ross** for Men and Women's Track and Field, **Kevin Hazlett** for Baseball, **Jim Fegan** for Women's Water Polo and Women's Swim and Dive, **Thom Hunt** for Men's Cross Country, and **Kim Lester** for Women's Volloyball.
