1) WELCOME / INTRODUCTIONS	P. Luster		
2) PRESIDENT'S REPORT a) Statewide Issues: President Pam Luster stated that she attended the 2018 CCLC Legislative Conference in Sacramento January 28-29. Also attending were the SDCCD college presidents, chancellor, a representation of the vice chancellors and trustees, and the student trustees. The San Diego and Imperial Counties Community Colleges (SDICCCA) reserve a room at which the legislators are scheduled to hear advocacy for community college issues from staff and students. Talking points included AB 19 – Community College Promise, and the continuation/expansion of the baccalaureate degrees at community colleges. Joe Newell, Mesa College AS President, also met with Rocky Chavez, the California State Assembly member for the 76 th District. b) Formula Funding Changes: Dr. Luster shared that the development of a new funding formula for the California Community Colleges will include outcomes metrics and a standalone online college. The outcome metrics include 50% based on apportionment with 25% based on socio- economic status of students, and 25% on success of students (degrees, certificates, transfer). The presidents/CEOs will gather to create a response to the funding formula in advance of the May revision of the governor's budget. Pam Luster currently serves as the SDICCCA representative on the CEO board. The discussion on this funding formula will be kept as a standing agenda item on President's Cabinet meetings. c) Baccalaureate Degree: Pam stated that new language will be negotiated for a bill by Senator Jerry Hill to extend the baccalaureate pilot program. Hopefully the LAO report will show student success in the 15 pilot programs (15 students will graduate from Mesa College in May 2018). d) Online College: Dr. Luster shared that a proposal for a standalone online college is in the governor's budget (this would be a new District). 1. Mesa is offering 49 more sections this semester			

compared to spring 2017. (12 less Census week classes, 38 more census day classes and 9 more DE classes)

As a district we are offering 107 more sections this year compared to last spring. (City is down 78 sections and Miramar is offering 114 more sections)

2. Mesa is down 109.7 FTES from last year. (Down 272.5 FTES in census classes but up 96.1 FTES in DE classes and 24.2 in Work Experience and Independent Study)
