2) A Citizen's Oversight Committee final meeting was held at SD Mesa College yesterday. The COC is a group that is	
established when colleges have bonds; the SDCCD COC	
has done an incredible job with our Prop S&N where we	
have a top bond rating, clean audits, and transparency in	
our annual report on the expenditure of the funds and how	
the community is impacted. Through Prop S&N, we have	
nine new academic and career training facilities, five major	
renovations, numerous infrastructure projects, parking	
facilities, and public service enhancements. We will	
potentially be entering a new bond in the November ballot.	
3) RE: VPI re-organization was presented to Chancellor's	
Cabinet; there was support from our sister campuses and	
throughout the District. This will be held until we have the	
Governor's May Revise report to make sure we have the	
funding.	
4) SDCCD will be moving to a single sign-on with Campus	
Solutions and Canvas; the Canvas should be done in the	
fall with work starting this summer and then a plan will be	
made for Campus Solutions. This would result in not	
having to use a ten-digit ID and only sign on using email and password. It was noted that Academic Senate has	
invited Peter Maharaj to speak on faculty concerns about	
the single sign-on issues.

a) Faculty Hiring Priority: Final list – President Hands thanked everyone for the hard work in preparing the FHP list. She reviewed the list and held some additional inquiry with Dr. O'Connor and the Deans on the final list. Mesa has 12 positions that will be posted in fall 2024. The things that were taken into consideration, in addition to the Program Review and faculty submissions, were percentage of full- time faculty to part-time faculty, enrollment trends, equitable outcomes for students, alignment with our Mission, Vision, Values, and recent retirements and resignations to stabilize departments. The FHP list was shown onscreen with the final positions in alphabetical order. (Note: The Physical Therapy Assistant position is pending approval of the baccalaureate degree.) The next steps include managers working with the Business Office to create their search processes and post in fall 2024 with a start in spring 2025. b) Climate Action Plan: Second Reading. The presentation highlighted that the plan is using the framework of the STARS Program (Sustainability, Tracking, Assessment, Rating System). The plan has 7 different categories and the presentation included the planning and governance goals/steps, education (sustainability topics in courses across the curriculum for incorporating sustainability into education materials), list of education goals/steps, transportation goals and steps, food and waste goals/steps, energy and water goals/steps, landscaping and grounds goals/steps. 5) OPERATIONS	1
 a) Instructional Updates: Vice President of Instruction, Isabel O'Connor, gave the following updates: 1) Fall enrollment data: Mesa College exceeded the enrollment target with 103%; it was 5,442 and Mesa reached 5,618 with the highest productivity in the district at 14.8. The headcount was 6% higher in fall compared to the previous fall. 	Isabel O'Connor, VPI

2) Common Course Numbering Update: This is moving into Phase I of common course numbering (courses that have common numbers and some elements in common) and they are proceeding with six courses: Common Composition, Argumentative Writing and Critical Thinking, Public Speaking, Introduction to Statistics (Math), Introduction to American Government and Politics, and Introduction to Psychology. The courses were selected because they have the highest number of enrollments across the State and they are part of the Cal-GETC. This will be discussed more at the Plenary: Academic Senate is working to develop a plan so that the templates for these six courses for common course numbering will start with the CID outlined and then will review what needs to be added/changed. A draft template will be reviewed at the Council next week and there will be three virtual convenings of faculty in these disciplines across the State in June where they will start broad then break down into facilitated breakout sessions. In those convenings, with guidance from the workgroups already in place, is where the templates will be developed. The goal is to have the template by August 15 but also have the summer work include Cal-GETC and UC-DCA agreements for the community college common courses. At the present time, each college submits courses individually for articulation agreements; the goal is if the courses have all those components and satisfies the template, that articulation should be system-wide. Phase II will likely start shortly. 3) CIO Conference updates: SB 895 Bachelor's pilot is moving along and we are in the best shape ever to see that Bill pass. The research and planning workgroup are doing an analysis of the duplication: that analysis was just released for round 2 – there is a round 3. There were at least 5 proposals from round 2 still to be resolved. They have received their analysis report and now they are putting together their response and next step is to engage with Cal State that opposed stating there is duplication. Our report from RP group has not arrived yet. Thanks to our Statewide Academic Senate who is working very closely with the State Chancellor's Office to inject some kind of structure to the process on claims of duplication. 4) Dr. O'Connor attended the APAHE conference as part of the Mesa College delegation of students and faculty, as well as Leland Simpliciano and Dean Ailene Crakes. Dr. Crakes was one of the Tri-chairs who planned the event -1,500 were in attendance. 5) Congratulations to Dean Cassandra Storey and the Strong Workforce team for their work vesterday at the tour of the Community Clinic that showcased the Allied Health Programs. b) Student Services Updates: Vice President of Student Larry Maxey, VPSS Services, Larry Maxey, gave the following updates: 1) Last week VPSS Maxey, President Hands, Johanna Aleman, and a Mesa student spoke at the Board of Trustees study session on Basic Needs. They presented to a number of people who might be able to contribute to that work.

 2) The Financial Aid Directors met with the Vice Presidents last week and they laid a foundation for moving forward and resolving issues associated with the rollout of financial aid and processing. They discussed the petitions process and moving forward with a summer transition. The Dean of Student Development, Ailene Crakes, will be handling the petitions process and taking the lead in terms of training and communicating with the other Deans to help them get onboard. 3) There will not be any registration holds for the summer due to the financial aid issues we have been facing. 4) The Scholarship Award Ceremony tickets are available: \$30, April 24, 2024, Mesa Gym. Please be there to support our students. 5) Lucio Lira has been announced as the new Pride Center Coordinator. 6) Black Student Success Week events flyer was distributed.
