2) PRESIDENT'S REPORT a) California Community Colleges Board of Governors Meeting (BOG): President Pam Luster reported on the Board of Governors meeting she attended yesterday afternoon and this morning held at Southwestern College. An agenda item discussed at the meeting was to sunshine the 2019-2020 budget priorities. Academic Senate President Kim Perigo attended and spoke at the public forum and stated the faculty are very much in support in helping make students successful, and only want a seat at the table. Terry Kohlenberg and Veronica Gerace also attended, as well as Connie Renda who presented at the Tuesday meeting on the Baccalaureate projects along with a co-presenter from Santa Monica College. President Luster stated she was disappointed in the State Chancellor's response on the viability of the program going forward and that it was not sustainable as well as other comments in contrast to the promise that he is in support of these programs. Terry Kohlenberg shared that San Francisco College had 5-6 students who presented on AB705 to get the word out to more students that it is available. Also, the Academic President at City College stated they had issued a vote of no confidence on the State Chancellor. Leslie Shimazaki was present this morning to accept the CTE gold star award for two programs: Physical Therapy Assistant and Radiologic Technology. President Luster stated the good news is legislation that impacts tutoring programs in that students no longer have to be individually referred to tutoring for colleges to be able to claim non-credit apportionment. The Chancellor's office stated they can make an administrative and not go through legislation – the BOG approved that yesterday. The colleges should be getting a Chancellor's Office Advisory soon that will confirm it is no longer the case that students would need to be referred to tutoring.	P. Luster P. Luster
