1) WELCOME / INTRODUCTIONS President Pam Luster welcomed all to the first meeting of the semester and asked for the self-introduction of attendees. President Luster shared that there was a site visit last week from the CAHIIM Accreditation Team; this was an on-campus site visit held for the Health Information Management (HIM) Baccalaureate program at San Diego Mesa College. Pam expressed her thanks to the Mesa faculty, administrators, and staff who prepared for the site visit, as well as Shelly Hess and Lynn Neault. The final report from the visiting site team is expected in December 2018, but it appears all went very well with only minor change to add some text to syllabi. Congratulations to Connie Renda, Holly Jagielinski, Christine Balderas, Dean Tina Recalde, and all the department faculty and staff.	P. Luster		
Pam also added, related to our HIM program, that AB 1406 is now on the Governor's desk to extend the sunset for all Baccalaureate pilot programs.			
a) PRESIDENT'S REPORT a) Funding Model / Enrollment Management: President Luster stated on August 31, Chancellor Carroll sent an email with district updates. The Chancellor's paragraph on "The State Budget and Enrollment Management" was shown on screen, and Pam stated this funding model is a challenge because we have initial numbers for the 70% FTES funding factor, but they are still running simulations on the supplemental and equity factors and the Student Success and Outcome metrics. The permanent funding is based on actuals from last year. Another challenge is that the 20% and 10% of the data simulations are being generated by the Chancellor's office and it is data that is not widely available to us in any data mart, so it is a challenge to know exactly where we are in these funding factors. Some Mesa College staff will attend a budget meeting tomorrow led by Executive Vice Chancellor Bonnie Dowd. Pam met with the Chairs and Deans to discuss that Mesa will have some reductions in the FTES targets for this year. Last year's FTES targets were not met; as a District we missed the target by about a 1,000 FTES and that will be deducted from our allocation from the Chancellor's Office. Also, because we were trying for growth targets, and	P. demand was not as high with our courses having fewer students, all three colleges and CE over spent by about 8 million dollars in terms of what we spent to generate the money that it would take to earn those targets. Therefore, not only did we not earn it, we spent it anyway. Pam stated she and our leaders have been seeing demand going down for a while and knew it would be difficult to make growth. Also, the new funding model had not been rolled out yet – it was not seen until January 2018 when the Governor's budget was			
presented. Additionally, the Chancellor's office did not give anyone a "heads up" they were going to try to implement this new model, thus making it difficult from a planning perspective.			
The 2018-2019 FTES targets are lower; we will have to trim our courses for the intercession, spring, and summer semesters. How much we trim them will be based on the recommendations from Deans and Chairs determined from the enrollments in their schools – difficult decisions may have to be made. It will be an equitable deduction; it will not be equal. We are going to have to look across our disciplines to see how our students choosing their courses.			
We do not have our final numbers, but the adopted budget has to go the board and all of these numbers have to be included. President Luster stated we have a fairly large expense deficit – it is in the multiple millions that we could be short, even with the new target numbers, if we do not plan carefully. She expects the Chancellor's Cabinet will have recommendations on how we take a look at expenses overall.

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stated she reported at Convocation they that had received an email from Dr. Phan, who is a Board of Governor's member, stating he had received a letter that AS wrote over the summer. This letter explained why they made a vote of no confidence, and wanted to be clear that participatory governance is important. Kim asked for meeting with John Sanskas in September during the Board of Governors meeting. She is also trying to get the region to support that meeting, especially since the San Diego region has some unique challenges that the board is overlooking when they make their policy; such as our transfer situation.		
Advocacy for the baccalaureate program was also done over the summer and it is at the Governor's table. Kim encouraged everyone to send an email or make a phone call telling the Governor you support the bill and encourage them to make a good decision.
