### LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

In the 2022-23 academic year, our institution embraced the theme 'Shining Light on Equity and Excellence,' drawing inspiration from the versatile symbolism of light, signifying both energy and guidance. Throughout the year, we addressed ongoing COVID-19 challenges by collaborating closely with our District colleagues to guide crucial decisions on remote work policies, mask mandates, vaccinations, and the gradual easing of State Emergency Conditions, prioritizing community health and safety. A standout accomplishment was our Enrollment Management Taskforce's comprehensive Strategic Enrollment Plan, presented at our final President's Cabinet Meeting. This visionary plan offered a panoramic view of our enrollment landscape and actionable strategies prioritizing equity and institutional goals.

Our Mesa2030 Facilities Taskforce focused on prioritizing facility needs for a potential bond measure. Their work has helped to envision a future campus infrastructure that continues to elevate learning and innovation. State Chancellor's Office support, totaling \$290,000, helped launch new initiatives, including the Mathematics, Engineering, and Science Achievement program and the Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander Student Achievement Program, reflecting dedication to the success of underserved student groups.

Active engagement in equity initiatives, including Hispanic-Serving Institution and Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution Grants, underscored our commitment to fostering an inclusive and outcomes-driven educational environment. Notably, our Black Student Fellows organized impactful events including our first ever Black Excellence Conference and contributed to the Statewide Black Student Success Week.

The year witnessed innovation and program expansion, introducing the Mesa Impactship Program (interning with a purpose), Small Business Virtual Incubator, and initiating brewing in our Fermentation program, providing practical experiences and growth opportunities. Expressing gratitude to generous donors for unwavering Basic Needs support, we coincided an appreciation event with the renaming of our Basic Needs Resource Center as the 'Pamela T. Luster Resource Center,' honoring a pivotal figure in our institutional journey. The grand opening of our Pride Center exemplified our commitment to providing brave and inclusive community spaces for our students.

Looking ahead, our 60th Anniversary Taskforce will curate activities, illuminating our ongoing journey toward equity and excellence. The 2022-23 academic year was defined by an unwavering commitment to equity, innovative programs, impactful partnerships, and a steadfast dedication to creating a more inclusive, just and excellence-driven educational institution. We trust that you will enjoy reviewing the many ways we have shined light on equity and excellence as much as we have enjoyed creating these special moments.



### Mesa College dedicated The Stand: The Pamela T. Luster Resource Center

In May 2023, Mesa College debuted the naming of The Stand: The Pamela T. Luster Resource Center, in honor of former President Emerita Dr. Pamela T. Luster.

As a champion for basic needs, Dr. Luster's vision of equity led to the creation of the Student Success and Equity Department, along with centers dedicated to serving basic needs, dreamers, foster youth, and veterans.

Additionally, the event honored and recognized multiple donors who helped the Mesa College Resiliency Fund become a reality; The Estate of William Hudlow, The Szeto Family, Dr. Richard Jenkins, Dr. Pamela T. Luster and Steven Wong & Corrina Lam.

### San Diego Mesa College Providing Free Feminine Hygiene Products

In 2022-23, Mesa College installed approximately 50 free feminine hygiene product dispensers in all women's and gender-neutral restrooms throughout the campus. About 20 of these dispensers were donated by Aunt Flow. Mesa College also provides menstrual products at the Student Health Center and at The Stand Resource Center.

This effort was started as part of an international movement to rectify the discriminatory taxation of menstrual products, which costs Californians born with a uterus over \$20 million annually. The Act requires public schools with students in grades 6 to 12, community colleges, and the California State University System, to provide menstrual products. 50 free feminine hygiene product dispensers

### Mesa's STAR TRIO Approved to Serve Undocumented Students



In 2022, the State Chancellor's Office and the US Department of Education expanded the equitable impacts of Mesa's STAR TRIO program by officially approving TRIO eligibility to include undocumented students. STAR TRIO jumped in and collaborated with our Borderless Scholars Program and the Dreamer Resource Center to maximize their undocumented student connections.

Federally funded to annually serve 225 students, STAR TRIO reached its initial objective of 5% enrollment for undocumented students for 2022-2023. They aim to double that enrollment in the next year. STAR TRIO serves students who are either firstgeneration, low-income, undocumented, and/or identify with a disability. Participants receive academic, career, and personal counseling, tutoring, specialized workshops, and student leadership opportunities.

### **Mesa's Enrollment Management Taskforce**

In the Fall of 2022, Mesa created and kickedoff the Enrollment Management Taskforce with the primary goal of creating a student-centered schedule that is predictable, responsive, efficient, and supports student success, completion, and equity outcomes. The task force began by developing a collaborative, innovative, and student-centered three-year strategic enrollment management plan (SEMP), which was completed in May 2023. The SEMP was developed by a cross functional collegewide team by analyzing existing data, assessing the effectiveness of current practices, and using best practices to make new recommendations for enrollment management. The task force recommended forming a governance committee to support meeting or exceeding enrollment targets and increasing overall enrollment and student retention. The Strategic Enrollment Management Committee will use data analysis and progress monitoring, to suggest improvements and adjustments to the Plan.



### Mesa College Selected as Partner by Generation Hope to participate in FamilyU

Nonprofit Generation Hope selected Mesa College to participate in their FamilyU assistance program. Through FamilyU, Generation Hope partners with colleges and universities across the country to increase the number of parenting college students who complete their programs and graduate.

Parenting students account for 1 in 5 undergraduate college students nationwide, however, their odds of college completion are far slimmer than college students who are not parenting. Despite having higher GPAs than students without children. parenting students are ten times less likely to graduate due to inadequate support systems designed to accelerate student parent success. The program will help Mesa to bolster completion odds for student parents by developing stronger support systems.

### Mesa College Alumna Advocating for AAPI Scholars: Dr. Nellie Tran's Insights on AAPI Education and Mental Well-being

This past year, alum Dr. Nellie Tran joined host Interim Chancellor of California Community Colleges, Daisy Gonzales, Ph.D. to talk about the importance of cultural competency at community college campuses. Dr. Tran is a published San Diego State University professor, and a Vietnamese-American research scientist who received her B.A. in psychology from UCLA after attending Mesa College and Miramar College.




While attending Mesa college, she was inspired by two of Mesa's faculty members: Professor Jaye Van Kirk and Professor Dina Miyoshi.

Dr. Nellie Tran credits both professors for being the only Asian American women that encouraged her to obtain a Ph.D. in Psychology. When asked how educators can show support for their AAPI students, Dr. Tran shares that access to information needs to be a priority.

Mesa College has already begun moving towards the right direction for AAPI communities by securing a \$1.5 million grant that provides opportunities to improve academic attainment of AAPI, Native American, and low-income students. Mesa College takes pride in its official designation as an AANAPISI by the United States Department of Education.

## EXCELLENCE



### The new Mesa Impactship Program (MIP): Interning with a Purpose supported 70+ students during spring 2023

The MIP was designed to promote workforce training and employment opportunities with a focus on underserved student populations, supporting students with exploring careers, developing professional skills, and compensating hands-on industry experiences through internships, volunteering, or Directed Clinical Practice (DCP). Eligible Mesa students received a one-time \$1,000 stipend or hourly compensation for student workplace training and enrollment in a Work Experience or a DCP course. The funding assists students with reducing or eliminating outof-pocket expenses such as childcare, equipment, fees, meals, and professional attire. Each semester, MIP students will be part of a cohort community supported by Mesa faculty to help them prepare for career pathways.

### Mesa launched the Small Business Virtual Incubator (SBVI)

The SBVI at San Diego Mesa College launched in Spring 2023 and has been a game-changer for student entrepreneurs, empowering them to transform their dreams into successful businesses. The first cohort of 14 students consisted of a diverse group across gender, racial and economic backgrounds. Additionally, each student was seeking varying degrees of assistance, from students who were just beginning on their entrepreneurial journey, to students who have been in the industry for years, and were looking for refinement, improvement and/or to take their business to the next level.

Through technical assistance and personalized 1:1 guidance with access to a pool of talented professionals, students received mentorship in various aspects of their business crucial to their success such as sales and marketing, organization, and financial strategies among other topics. Many participants successfully launched their businesses or grew an existing business, contributing to the local economy and many have already started building generational wealth.

By providing mentorship and access to diverse talent, the program empowers students to transform their passion into tangible and thriving ventures, leaving a lasting impact on their lives and the community.

### Mesa College has saved students over \$4 million dollars through zero text book cost initiatives

Through 2023, Mesa College has saved students over \$4 million dollars through zero textbook cost initiatives (ZTC). ZTC degree pathways are degrees where a student can attend and graduate from Mesa without paying for a single college textbook. Equity and overcoming barriers to student success are the hallmarks of ZTC.

As the leading college of equity and excellence, Mesa College believes that textbooks should not be a barrier to education. As of 2023, Mesa has 14 ZTC degree pathways. Mesa college faculty and staff have been dedicated to this initiative, and have overhauled classes to make them ZTC compatible.



Members of San Diego's congressional delegation, including Rep. Sara Jacobs, Rep. Scott Peters and Rep. Juan Vargas presented the San Diego Community College District with a check for \$3.4 million in funding from the U.S. Congress. The funding, approved in December 2022 as part of the fiscal year 2023 Omnibus Appropriations Bill, will benefit and better serve lesbian, gay, and transgender students, youth who have recently aged out of the foster care system, and by supporting new and expanded centers serving undocumented students.

As good stewards, Mesa College utilized HEERF funding to provide direct aid to students, and support programs and services.

### Mesa College Athletics Trainer Saves Life of Senior Runner

During Fall 2022, Mesa College Athletic Trainer and alumnus, Yuki Matsuzawa, along with two students and a coach, helped save the life of a 66 year old athlete, who collapsed on field after his event during the annual Senior Games Track Meet held on campus at Merrill Douglas Stadium.



When the senior collapsed student-athletes, Sidney Garcia and Azucena Hernandez, immediately called 911, and ran to get Yuki Matsuzawa, the Mesa College Certified Athletic Trainer for the event. Upon arrival, Yuki checked for responsiveness and breathing where he realized the man was barely responsive. He then immediately applied the AED and began chest compressions for CPR, and ensured that EMS personnel were on their way while continuing CPR until the AED advised for a shock.

Yuki continued CPR until the man began breathing again and regained consciousness.

Coach Sean Ricketts and others followed Mesa's Emergency Action Plan where the EMS crew took over and the senior was stabilized and recovered at Sharp Hospital later that day. According to coaching staff, Yuki Matsuzawa's swift actions and emergency medical training as a Certified Athletic Trainer undoubtedly saved this man's life. The senior runner recovered well and even earned a medal, placing second in the Men's 65-69 age group.

### Dr. Inna Kanevsky on debunking misinformation regarding mental health and her 1.1 million Tik-tok Fame

Dr. Inna Kanevsky, Mesa College Professor, has taken the mental health side of Tik-Tok by storm by debunking falsely spread information.

With 1.1 million followers, her videos concentrate on exposing false information contained in widely spread content to prevent it from affecting the mental health of people using the app, especially teenagers and children who can be easily distressed.

Dr. Kanevsky was interviewed by CBS, where she explained that she spoke to people at TikTok regarding the widespread misinformation about psychology and mental health available in the content the app circulates.

For the last few years, Kanevsky has been battling psychological misinformation on TikTok, debunking faulty mental health information one video at a time.

She affirms that you can give people advice based on your experience as long as it

is clear that that's where you're coming from. With a million followers and more than 36 million views, Kanevsy has become a TikTok star and reverse influencer herself.

Alison Steinberg fellowship with Stanford University Global Studies Department in School of Humanities and Sciences

The Stanford University Global Studies Department determined Alison Steinberg as a fellow for the School of Humanities and Sciences. The program is called EPIC (Educational Partnership for Internationalizing Curriculum) and there were 11 California community college faculty chosen as fellows this year.

It began in August 2022 with a multiday meeting on the Stanford campus and concluded on the Stanford campus in May 2023 where Steinberg's project "Bringing Global Consciousness and an Equity Lens to Information Literacy Instruction" was shown to the Stanford community and guests at "The EPIC Symposium". With the support of the Stanford community, she created Information Literacy Modules in Canvas that use globally conscious research examples. Her goal is to create modules that can be used in total or in parts depending on what aspect of the research process the classroom faculty member wants to focus on.

These modules became available in the Fall 2023 through the Canvas Commons for any Canvas community member to download and use with their classes. During this year, she connected with various faculty and programs throughout Stanford to help us

with our projects as well as a monthly three-hour meeting with the fellows and Stanford faculty where we discuss globalizing curriculum, interact with Stanford faculty involved with global issues and check in on project progress.



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San Diego Mesa College Student Wesley Renda Invents "WesCup", available in over thirty 7/11 Stores in Spring 2023

Mesa College Student, Wesley Renda, has found a way to change the drinking game forever. He invented a cup called, "WesCup", that is able to hold three drinks in one cup. The drinking cup allows consumers to enjoy three flavors of their favorite drink at one time.

The TV Center, KGRM, and The Gramblinite were all the resources for him to create content. His first experience as a journalist was at San Diego Mesa College, where he worked as a Staff Writer. He was able to gain experience covering local news and writing opinion pieces. He plans to finish school and pursue a career as a political journalist.



### PARTNERSHIPS

### Mesa College Partnered with SDSU to Receive a \$1 Million USDA Grant to Support Sustainable Food and Agriculture Training for Latinx Students

As Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSI), SDSU partnered with Mesa College to create a pipeline of students from community college through graduate school. Selected Mesa College students received financial support to take the team-taught class at SDSU and for researching at the college's vegetable garden.

Students who continue in the program will receive counseling, scholarship opportunities, and mentoring from faculty and peers. The Transnational Approaches to Sustainable Food Futures (CAL 400) is taught by an interdisciplinary team of faculty. They will prepare undergraduate and graduate students to engage in summer internships in San Diego and Mexico, learning from immigrant and Indigenous farmers and cooks. The grant will then support the research projects of 36 undergraduates, seven master's students, and three Ph.D. students.

Renda is serving a three-year term in office as president-elect that started in July 1, 2023. Renda has been in the HIM industry for 25+ years. In 2013, Renda designed, developed, implemented, and led the first HIM Bachelor of Science



degree program in the state of California.

She is also co-department chair for Allied Health in the School of Health Sciences and Public Service. Both programs are nationally, regionally, and locally accredited. Renda also ensured both programs received external accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Health Information and Informatics Education (CAHIIM) so Mesa Graduates are eligible for the RHIT and RHIA exams after graduating from the programs.

### The Value of Mesa's Baccalaureate Program Supported by UCLA Study

A 2022 University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) study confirmed that Mesa College's bachelor's degree provides an excellent choice for students who otherwise might not have pursued higher education. Research by the Civil Rights Project found that the bachelor's degrees help meet the need for college-educated workers and offer an education for economicallydisadvantaged students. Additionally, the RP Group recognized Hai Hoang at Mesa College for his leadership in the statewide evaluation leading to AB 927. Hai collaborated with UCLA to publish a research brief titled "Benefits and **Opportunities: California's Community College** Baccalaureate Programs," at UC Davis, which provided compelling evidence that the Bachelor's Degree Program has increased access and success for special populations, helped them secure good-paying jobs, and is benefiting the California economy.



### **OLYMPIANS SHINE IN SPORTS**

Mesa College celebrated the 50th anniversary of landmark federal law of Title IX, enacted in 1972 to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex in all federally funded educational institutions. Title IX created a dramatic increase in interscholastic and intercollegiate athletic opportunities for girls and women.



### Mesa Wins the DeVore Trophy for the 4th time

San Diego Mesa College Athletics has been awarded the DeVore Trophy for the 2022-23 calendar year. The DeVore Award is presented each year to a Pacific Coast Athletics Conference (PCAC) member college with the most successful men's and women's intercollegiate athletic program for the academic year. This is Mesa's 4th time winning the trophy, leading all other schools in Chet DeVore trophy awards.

Hired by UCLA Bioengineering Department as Assistant Professor

The UCLA Samueli School of Engineering welcomed an outstanding scholar to the Bioengineering Department - Mesa College Alumnus Mireille Kamariza, who joined as an assistant professor. Kamariza has demonstrated efforts in diversifying representation in STEM and intends to continue pushing for more equity and inclusion in scientific academia.

Selected to join the Inaugural Cohort of the U.S. Digital Corps

The U.S. Digital Corps has selected Ionathan Hart, Mesa College Alumnus, to be a part of the inaugural cohort of the U.S. Digital Corps. The U.S. Digital Corps is a program launched last year by the White House to bring earlycareer technologists to serve in the federal government. She started thinking about a career in GIS, and in May 2019, she completed the GIS certificate of achievement at Mesa College – the requirement to get an


