Despite this challenging year, our students have persevered. This year's graduating class is truly impressive. Mesa College is graduating 2,202 students, and awarding 2,313 academic degrees and 380 certificates, a 3 % percent increase from last year. Mesa College is conferring 28 Bachelor's Degrees in Health Information Management. We have 75 valedictorians and over 500 students graduating with honors. 2021 Virtual Scholarship Awards Ceremony on Weds, May 12 - Join us for the Celebration

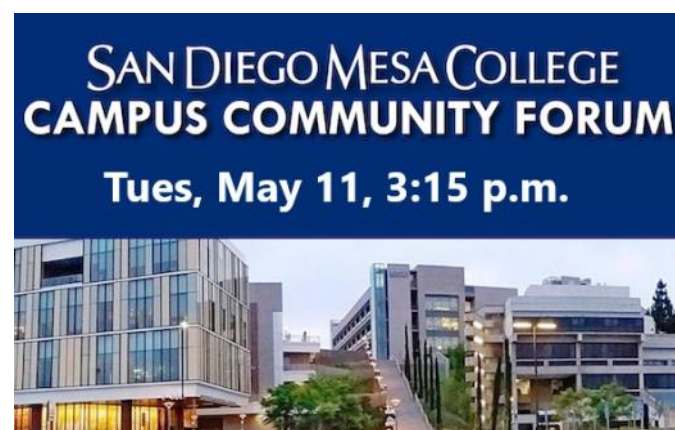
This year, we will celebrate the Mesa College Virtual Scholarship Awards Ceremony on Wednesday, May 12, at 5:00 p.m. Chancellor Carroll and Board of Trustees President Maria Nieto Senour will join us as we celebrate our 2021 Scholarship winners. This year, Mesa College offered 115 scholarships. Of those, 103 scholarships provided awards. Combined, over \$130,000 was provided across 223 awards to 147 students (several students received more than one award and several scholarships had more than one awardee). Faculty, staff, students and their families, donors, and members of the community are all encouraged to attend the Ceremony. Mesa Pathways

Mesa Pathways Committee awarded over \$29,000 to six projects through the Mesa Pathways Grants. Funded projects include: STEM Peer Mentoring, Grading for Equity Faculty Inquiry Group, support for Mesa Journeys project and CREDO Instruct. Another



round of grants is slated for Fall 2021. The Guided Majors and Mapping Workgroup presented data and findings from this semester's Mesa Mixers at the April 13 Community Forum. They voted among the various sorting categories and a name for the "meta-major" categories. Results will be announced in May. The Mesa Pathways Fellows continue to do great work. Dr. Monique Greene and the Riverside City College Pathways student leader team joined the Fellows on April 19 to discuss challenges and strategies for encouraging all student as leaders. The Black Student Experience (BSE) longitudinal study is a collaboration between the Fellows and Institutional Effectiveness. The study will assist in better understanding Black / African American students' ongoing experiences that relate to their educational journey. On May 19, the Fellows will host a Student Leadership Summit, which will provide student leaders from across the campus a space to share thoughts, ideas, and begin work towards collaborative vision and mission aimed at student success.

Administrative Services Update

In preparation for the Fall 2021 semester, Administrative Services is working in support of student services and instruction as the campus prepares to transition to in-person activities. As a campus, we continue following guidance put forth by the CDC. Any employees who need to access campus are required to stop in to get screened through the Mesa College Stockroom, or the Mesa College Technology Department located in the loading area behind Mesa Commons.

The Reopening Discussion Group convened for a discussion this month, and as we move towards more in-person activities, we will be meeting two more times before the end of the spring semester. Mesa2030:

The Mesa2030 Task Force is wrapping up nearly 2 years of work visioning the future of Mesa College. During April, the first drafts of the Mesa2030 Comprehensive Master Plan and the RoadMap to Mesa2030 Strategic Plan were shared with President's Cabinet, Planning and Institutional Effectiveness Committee, Classified Senate, Academic Senate, and Associated Students. During this process, the campus community shared their input and feedback. Both the Mesa2030 Task Force and the Strategic Planning Task Force integrated this feedback into updated drafts that will be shared back to each of the groups for a second reading and a vote of support. Among the most significant changes includes updated language to include a more explicit focus on environmental justice and climate change. Check in with your representative to learn more!

Data Dashboards: AB705 and Student Success.

Before AB705 passed, Mesa was already leading the way with innovations in English curriculum and placement methods. Since 2015, more than twice the percent of students who complete Transfer level Math and English in their first year in 2015 did so in 2020, going from 7% in 2015 to 16% in 2020. The largest gains were seen by the most disproportionately impacted students, Black and Hispanic/Latinx students saw triple the percent of students complete in 2020 compared to 2015. Over 1/3 of first-time students are completing transfer English in their first year, up from 18% in 2015 and more than ¼ are completing transfer-level math, up from 13% in 2015. 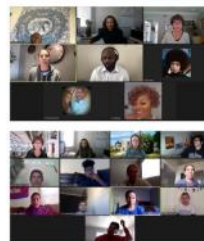
