#### Welcome Week

# San Diego Mesa College Foundation Resiliency Fund Campaign

We know that our students are facing even greater challenges than in the past. Through participation in The Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice #RealCollege Survey for California Community Colleges, we learned that students have fewer resources and greater financial constraints. Results of the Study showed that nearly 1 in 5 Mesa students are housing insecure and almost 50% are food insecure, with limited access to nutritionally adequate food. While dedication and hard work are key ingredients to success, financial instability means that one unexpected expense such as a flat tire or missed day at work due to illness or injury can put their entire education at risk.

Over the summer, the <u>San Diego Mesa College</u>
<u>Foundation</u> met with college leadership to discuss how we could help students overcome financial setbacks so that short-term problems do not pre-





vent long-term success. Out of this came a bold idea: create a "Resiliency Fund," which will provide emergency loans and grants to students experiencing financial setbacks that put them at risk of dropping out. Our goal is ambitious: raise \$250,000 towards the Resiliency Fund to help at least 1,000 students overcome financial setbacks and stay in school. The Foundation has secured \$75,000 in matching funds and as of today, we have raised over \$25,000 toward the Fund. Our entire campus and broader community are invited to invest, and donors have the chance to double their impact through November. Please join us as we preserve the dream of a college education.

#### **Fall Convocation 2019**

Thank you to all who attended fall 2019 Convocation, which focused on "The Privilege of Serving Mesa College Students and Our Community." Our keynote speaker and anti-racism activist, Tim Wise, discussed our equity efforts and vision to serve our students in all aspects of their educational journey. Mesa Pathways Co-chairs Toni Parsons and Howard Eskew presented an activity for attendees to practice playing the student and planning the first two semesters of an intended major. We also heard from the Chancellor and District representatives, the new presidents of Academic Senate, Manuel Velez; Classified Senate, Charlie Lieu; and Associated Students, Taylor Carpenter. We also proudly announced the Dr. Judy Sundayo Diversity Scholarship, in honor of all of Dr. Sundayo's valuable work that contributes to Mesa College being a better learning institution for our students.

#### Mesa College Hosts Tim Wise for Multiple Events

Mesa College was proud to host Tim Wise for four oncampus events including Convocation, a workshop, an NCORE alumni lunch, and a public event. Students, faculty, staff, administration, and colleagues from other institutions attended to hear about "The Impact of Privilege on Equity in Higher Education." Mr. Wise shared the importance of creating a culture that sustains the efforts of equity for students, offering that we must actively interrogate what it means to belong versus what it means to have to prove that one belongs. He stated, "We can occupy the same space, but not have the same experience." There is more work to be done to make education about collective liberation and uplift, rather than just about individual success. As faculty, administrators, and staff, I encourage us all to continue to create a community that fosters inclusion through equity and excellence, and to show

#### **Mesa Pathways Summer Progress**

As the new academic year begins, so does Mesa Pathways. Summer saw faculty come together for The Mesa Pathways Summer Institute held on June 3-5 which featured data workshops, program mapping, and a team from the ASCCC sharing information about areas of interest development. The Pathways Committee and the workgroups have begun meeting to discuss plans for the upcoming year. Disciplines continue to work towards completing mapping by the end of Fall semester, as well as improving the Mesa Pathways webpage in the Brave Communication workgroup. Also, over the summer, a group of faculty members worked to update Mesa's Guided Pathways Essential Practices: Scale of Adoption Self-Assessment, which will be used by the Mesa Pathways Committee works to set it goals and milestones for the 2019-2020 academic year. The submission date for this document has been changed from September 30<sup>th</sup> to March 30<sup>th</sup>. This Flex activities planned for the Fall semester include mapping, equity, and a presentation on areas of interest lead by the ASCCC Guided Pathways Team headed by Janet Fulks. Mesa Mixers, which will give opportunity for cross disciplinary discussion, begin September 11. We are excited to continue our work on Mesa Pathways and look forward to working with many of you this semester.

#### **FAST Center Grand Opening**

On Thursday, August 22, the Mesa community celebrated the grand opening of the Fostering Academic Success & Transitions (FAST) Center – the first of its kind at a community college in the San Diego region. The FAST Center, located in D-102, is a place where students who are current or foster youth may gather and receive support services and have access to computers and specific resources to meet their needs. The Center is also about creating a sense of community. As the leading college of equity and excellence, Mesa strives to provide support that meets the unique needs of our diverse community of students. With programs like NextUp and FAST Scholars, Mesa College is able to better support foster youth in accomplishing their educational goals and developing self-
