
### Art Inspires, Art Awakens

Each semester, we hold a President's Community Breakfast to invite the community to our campus to learn more about Mesa's latest initiatives and programs. The Spring 2019 Breakfast focused on our Arts programs, and over 70 community members and representatives from local government, non-profit, business, and education attended. We provided a campus-wide update and discussed our various Arts programs. We heard from several enthusiastic faculty members, and celebrated our partnership with the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego. During the event, guests participated in an arts activity, and art students Akiko Mims and Albert Cartagenes shared their experiences and spoke about the value of Mesa's arts program. Guests also enjoyed a display of the World Cultures Artwork Collection and participated in tours of the newly remodeled Fine Arts building. Thank you to all of our faculty and staff who made this event a success.



In March, I visited Sacramento to discuss the importance of addressing community college students' basic needs such as food and housing insecurities and homelessness. I participated in a panel regarding The Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice #RealCollege Survey for California Community Colleges. As a part of this effort, I am co-chairing the Affordability Food and Housing Access Task Force that has made multiple recom-

mendations towards addressing student needs.

In the fall of 2017, 44% of Mesa College students experienced food insecurity, 46% experienced housing insecurity, and 15% reported as homeless. In the fall of 2018, those numbers increased to 47% being food insecure, 62% were housing insecure, and 18% reported as homeless. Clearly, there is a need to address the basic needs of our students. Most research identifies community college students as a population particularly impacted by unaffordable college costs. Some of the many goals of the taskforce are for college leaders to come together to collaborate around best practices, remove policy barriers, and to establish effective partnerships. I will keep you posted on this important work.

#### **HSI Conference**

Mesa College launched its inaugural HSI Conference on Friday, March 15. This year's theme was "What does it mean to *serve* as a Hispanic-*Serving* Institution?" While the College continues to make strides to better support our students, one common area that seems to recur across all HSI institutions is that of service. Topics at the conference included themes around equity and social justice. We heard from several students who participated in featured student panels and showcased the spirit of innovation and advocacy that characterize our faculty and staff's commitment to serving our underrepresented students. On Wednesday, March 13, 2019, over 200 people including Mesa faculty, staff, and students, along with community members—attended the Grand Opening of the newly remodeled Fine Arts Building. Collectively, these events celebrate the important women activist leaders who have gone before us and championed important causes for the marginalized and the voiceless. Sophomore soccer player Karlyn Ironside will continue her academic and athletic career, as she has signed with Cal State Los Angeles. Women's soccer players Madison Cosgrove, Ana Zick, Lillian Hill, Ana Salas, Marissa Stafford, Taylor Powers, Natalie Polan, and Alexis Salzwedel were all honored as scholar-athletes by the California Community Colleges Soccer Coaches Association (CCCSCA).
