- Incorporate an understanding of the implications of individual and cultural differences, and adapt behavior and delivery of care accordingly in all aspects of physical therapy services with respect to patients' values, preferences, and needs.

Information Sessions

Information sessions for the PTA Program are mandatory and will be held in two formats. Applicants must either attend a Zoom Information Session or watch the pre-recorded Information Session posted on the website.

Zoom Information Sessions will be held 2-3 times in each Fall and Spring semester and are free to attend. RSVP's are not required for attendance. Please check the website regularly for any updates to the information session schedule and Zoom link.

The pre-recorded Information Session is posted on the website.

Attendance at a Zoom Information Session or viewing of the pre-recorded Information Session is required to ensure the applicant is prepared and completed the application process correctly. Applicants will confirm completion of this requirement in the online application.

Transcript Information

Applicants are required to upload unofficial transcripts for **ALL** prerequisite courses and language verification when they submit their online application. This includes uploading unofficial transcripts for any course completed in the district (Mesa, City or Miramar) and any in-progress prerequisite course.

Additionally, applicants are required to submit **official transcripts** to SDCCD for any courses that were not completed within the district (Mesa, City or Miramar). Multi-Criterion Screening Process & Rubric

The PTA Program at San Diego Mesa College utilizes a Multi-Criterion Screening Process. All applications will be submitted online and must be submitted within the posted application period. The Application Period is posted on the PTA Program Website (<u>PTA Program Website</u>)

Completed applications must include responses for each area within the application*:

- General Information
- Academic Degree, College Diplomas or Relevant Certificates
- Prerequisite Courses
- Unofficial Transcripts for Prerequisite Courses
- PTA Essential Function Verification
- Observation/Volunteer Hours or Work Experience

- Life Experiences or Special Circumstances
- Language Proficiency other than English
- Completion and Submission of Application

*Note – Some areas will be verified by uploading a specific document. Other areas will be verified by in the online application by clicking a check box or typing your name as a digital signature.



Application Process

Applicants must apply to San Diego Mesa College and obtain a student ID number (CSID) before applying to the PTA Program. This application process is free and can accessed here <u>Apply to</u> <u>Mesa</u>

Applicants will submit the online application to the Physical Therapist Assistant Program <u>PTA</u> <u>Program Online Application</u>

Applicants should ensure they include a **valid email address** in the online application. All application communication will be completed using the email address included in the application. If an applicant does not respond to email communication, their application will be considered incomplete and be withdrawn. Please review the application details and Rubric below. Applicants who have not included responses for all prerequisites courses, observation/volunteer hours/work experience hours or the statement of interest will not be scored.

Prerequisites

- Completion or proof of in progress status is required for each prerequisite.
- English Placement of 50 or higher in BOTH reading and writing is required. If your English placement is lower than 50 you will need to take English 101 or a higher English course. The English prerequisite is not considered in the GPA calculation for the application process however must be verified in the online application.
- Points are awarded for the remaining prerequisites based on the Multi-Criterion Screening Rubric below.
- Anatomy and Physiology and Introduction to Physical Therapy must be completed in the last 5 years. All prerequisites must be completed with a C or better.
- Unofficial transcripts for ALL prerequisite courses must be included in the application.

Observation/Volunteer Hours or Work Experience

- Proof of completion of a minimum of 50 hours is required for the application to be considered.
- Points are awarded based on the Multi-Criterion Screening Rubric below.
- A **minimum of 50 hours** observing a PT or PTA in any physical therapy setting is required for the PTA Application. The hours need to be verified by the PT or PTA and the verification form will be uploaded in the application.
- Work experience as a PT aide in any Physical Therapy setting or a RNA in a Skilled Nursing Facility will be considered for this requirement.
- Observation/Volunteer Hours or Work Experience form must be uploaded in the online application (form can be found on the PTA Program 'How to Apply' website).

*PHYR 291 may be offered in the summer session. If the student completes PHYR 291 in the summer, they will not enroll in PHYR 291 in the semester III.

Continuation in the program is predicated on the successful completion of each semester. The courses in each semester act as the prerequisites for the next semester's work.



Graduation Requirements

All PTA Program graduates must earn the associate degree including PTA program curriculum and general education (GE) requirements in order to sit for the National Physical Therapy Examination for the PTA.

As the Program is an Associate Degree curriculum, the District-required general education (GE) courses <u>must</u> be completed before graduation. In the PTA program, the entrant should plan on having the GE courses completed before the third semester (and not have a work schedule that could interfere) in order to allow for full time availability for directed clinical practice. This availability in the third and fourth semester allows for increased ease in providing a well-rounded clinical experience.

The entrant is encouraged to complete as many of the GE courses (Multicultural, P.E., Humanities, etc.) as possible <u>prior</u> to entering the program so as to allow for an increase in time to be spent on study or work while in the program. Completion also allows for an ability to have increased flexibility to participate in directed clinical practice.

In an agreement with the School of Exercise Science, Health Education, and Athletics, the <u>graduates</u> of the program are exempt from completing the district's Health Education course degree requirement.

Frequently Asked Questions

- How can I find out if the courses I have taken outside of the San Diego Community College District will transfer or meet the prerequisite course requirements? You will find general information on the prerequisite courses in this packet. All coursework must be completed at a regionally-accredited college. It is recommended that you meet with an academic counselor with specific questions regarding prerequisites and general education requirements.
- 2. Can you give me a list of facilities where I can complete my observation hours? We do not have a list of facilities that can be sent to you. It is recommended that you contact facilities close to where you live and ask if they will allow you to observe physical therapists or physical therapist assistants. Some facilities have waiting lists for people to observe so you should contact facilities as soon as possible. Information about potential sites will only be given at Information Sessions. Dates and times of information sessions may be found on the Allied Health website page.
- 3. Can I complete the program in less than two years? No, the program cannot be completed in less than two years since the technical courses are taught sequentially and require two full years for completion.



4. Can I work while completing the PTA program?

Students are encouraged to have a flexible work schedule if they are working while completing the PTA Program. The PTA Program uses a cohort model with all students in classes together for the 2 years of the program. Classes are offered at a specific day and time and do not have flexibility to adjust. Attendance is mandatory for all classes.

Program Costs

In order to improve student financial literacy, the Physical Therapist Assistant Program at San Diego Mesa College has provided the following cost breakdown for the two years of the program. The costs are the best current estimate and may vary slightly.

Tuition (Based on Fall 2024 tuition rates):

\$46 per unit for in-state students x 46.5 units (PTA curriculum only, includes PHYR 210

prerequisite*) = \$2,139.00

Out of state students add an additional \$331 per unit, \$377 x 46.5 units (PTA curriculum

only, includes PHYR 210 prerequisite*) = \$17,530.50

*To be eligible for licensure you must complete the Associate degree which is approximately 60 units.

- \$40 per semester for automobiles (5 semesters)
- \$30 per semester for Carpool permits
- \$17.50 per semester for Motorcycle permits

Health Fee (Based on Fall 2024 semester):
