It is my personal goal for San Diego Mesa College Career Center to become a national leader in career services. In doing so, we will continue to develop new ways to introduce a greater number of students to the Career Center. In the 2016-2017 academic year the Career Center:

- Hosted a spring and fall job fair with over 100 participating employers
- Awarded 18 internship stipends, up to \$3,500 each, to students who pursued meaningful, unpaid internships through work experience classes - made possible through CTE Enhancement fund
- Launched a new job and internship board called "The Mesa Job Network" which currently houses over 450 employers and 660 local job/internship postings


Mission and Vision

The Stand

The Stand is a resource from the Student Success & Equity Department. The Stand provides FREE food to meet students' food insecurities. Additionally, The Stand provides FREE professional clothing for students to help prepare for the workforce. The Stand is solely sustained by food, clothing, and monetary donations. Our donations come from administrators, faculty, staff, students, and community members.

The Stand Highlights:

- In 2016–2017, The Stand provided **2098** food services to **439 individual students.**
- We had a total of \$7,709.00 donated to The Stand!
- Our expenditures from March through June totaled \$1,426.07. The majority of the expenditures \$1,034.21 have been for food to directly support students. \$391.86 was used to purchase additional donation bins.
- In May 2017, Mesa College ASG voted to transfer the remaining balance of \$3,000.00 from their account to **The Stand**.
- In addition, Mesa College Financial Aid
 Department made a one-time donation of

 \$500.00 in support of The Stand.
- The Mesa College Psychology Club held a clothing drive in March 2017. The president of the club worked with Costco to obtain a one-time donation from the Morena Blvd location.
- Mesa College ASG & Peer Navigators ran an internal food drive with the CRUISE students.

Student Highlights

In the year 2014–2015, Governor Brown signed a budget providing funding on a one-time basis to create greater incentives for California Community Colleges to develop, enhance, retool, and expand quality career technical education offerings that build upon existing community college regional capacity to respond to regional labor market needs. This funding was referred to as the "Career and Technical Education (CTE) Enhancement Funds." San Diego Mesa College used some of the funding that was allocated to the campus Career Center to establish a paid summer internship pilot project. The pilot gave Mesa College CTE students an opportunity to be paid during their summer internship experience in CTE fields.









During the fall & spring semesters, our office puts on career fairs that feature a diverse group of industries. FALL OPEN HOUSE
