INTENT



INTENT

- Advancing the systemwide goal to boost achievement for all students
- Emphasis on eliminating achievement gaps for students from traditionally underrepresented groups

CURRENT CHALLENGES

Most students never complete a degree or certificate or transfer to a four year college or university.

Students who reach a defined education goal such as degree or transfer take a long time to complete their goals, often accumulating excess units.

Cost to attend CCC is higher due to the slow time to completion and lack of financial aid to cover costs.

Older and working CCC students are often left behind, lacking services and financial aid that suit their needs.

Achievement gaps persist across the CCCs



SEA PROGRAM

HOW?

- (A) Implementing activities and practices pursuant to the California Community College Guided Pathways Grant Program.
- (B) Ensuring students complete their educational goals and a defined course of study.
- (C) Providing quality curriculum, instruction, and support services to students who enter college deficient in English and mathematics to ensure these students complete a course of study in a timely manner.





GOAL 1:

Increase by at least 20 percent the # of CCC students annually who acquire associates degrees, credentials, certificates, or specific skill sets that prepare them for an in-demand job.



GOAL 2:

Increase by 35 percent the # the number of CCC transferring annually to a CSU or UC



GOAL 3:

Decrease the average number of units accumulated by CCC students earning associate's degrees from approximately 87 to 79 total units



GOAL 4:

Increase the percentage of exiting CTE students who report being employed in their field of study, from the statewide average of 60% to 69%



GOAL 5:

Reduce equity gaps by 40% across all of the previous measures through faster improvements among traditionally underrepresented students, and closing the achievement gaps within 10 years.



GOAL 6:

Reduce regional achievement gaps across the previous measures through faster improvements among colleges located in regions with the lowest educational attainment of adults, with the goal of closing the gap within 10 years.

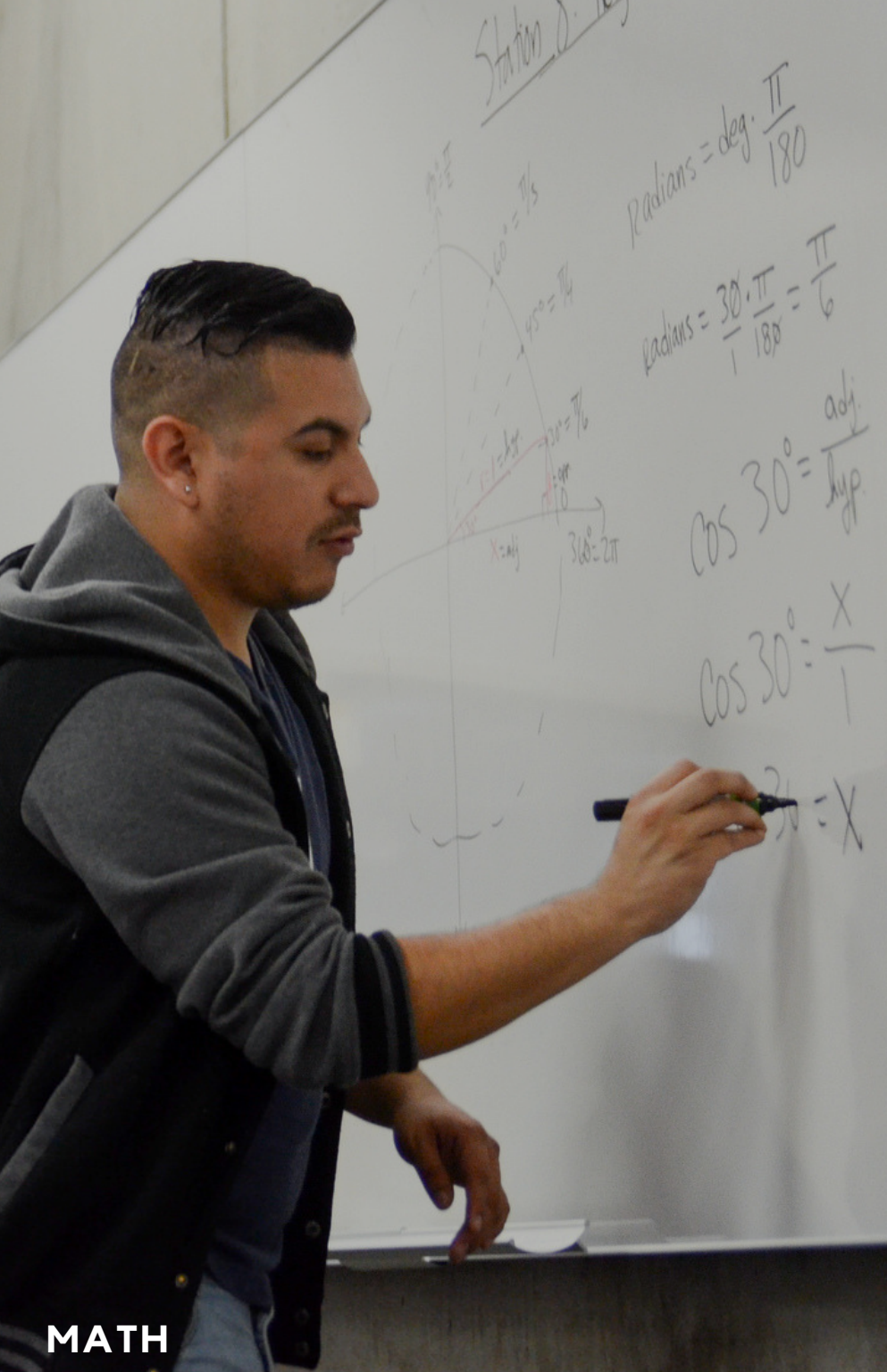

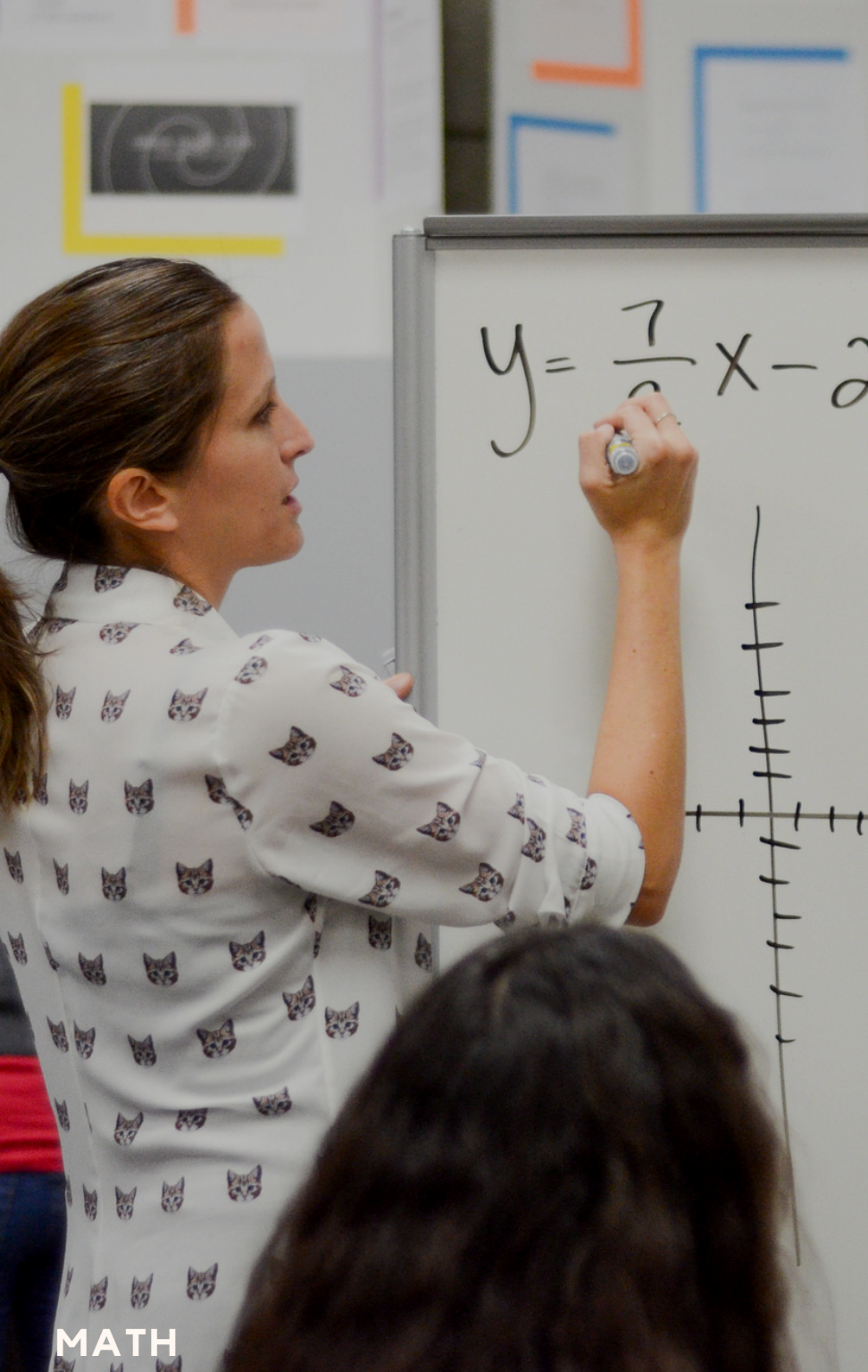

MATH (CONT'D)

- 16 sections of the new course Math 96X – Intermediate Algebra w/ Support
- Students encouraged to fill Math 104X & 116X courses offered in the spring
- 3 sections of the new course Math 104X – Trigonometry w/Support scheduled for Spring
- 3 sections of the new course Math 116X – College Algebra w/ Support on the scheduled for spring
- Fall 2019: Discussions in the early stages to consider offering Math 119X – Statistics w/ Support & Math 141X – Precalculus w/ Support



ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION

- ESOL → ELAC coincides with curricular changes
- Why? Backwards design, acceleration, integration, authenticity, and state mandates
- How? New curriculum created via student focus groups and cross-district workgroups



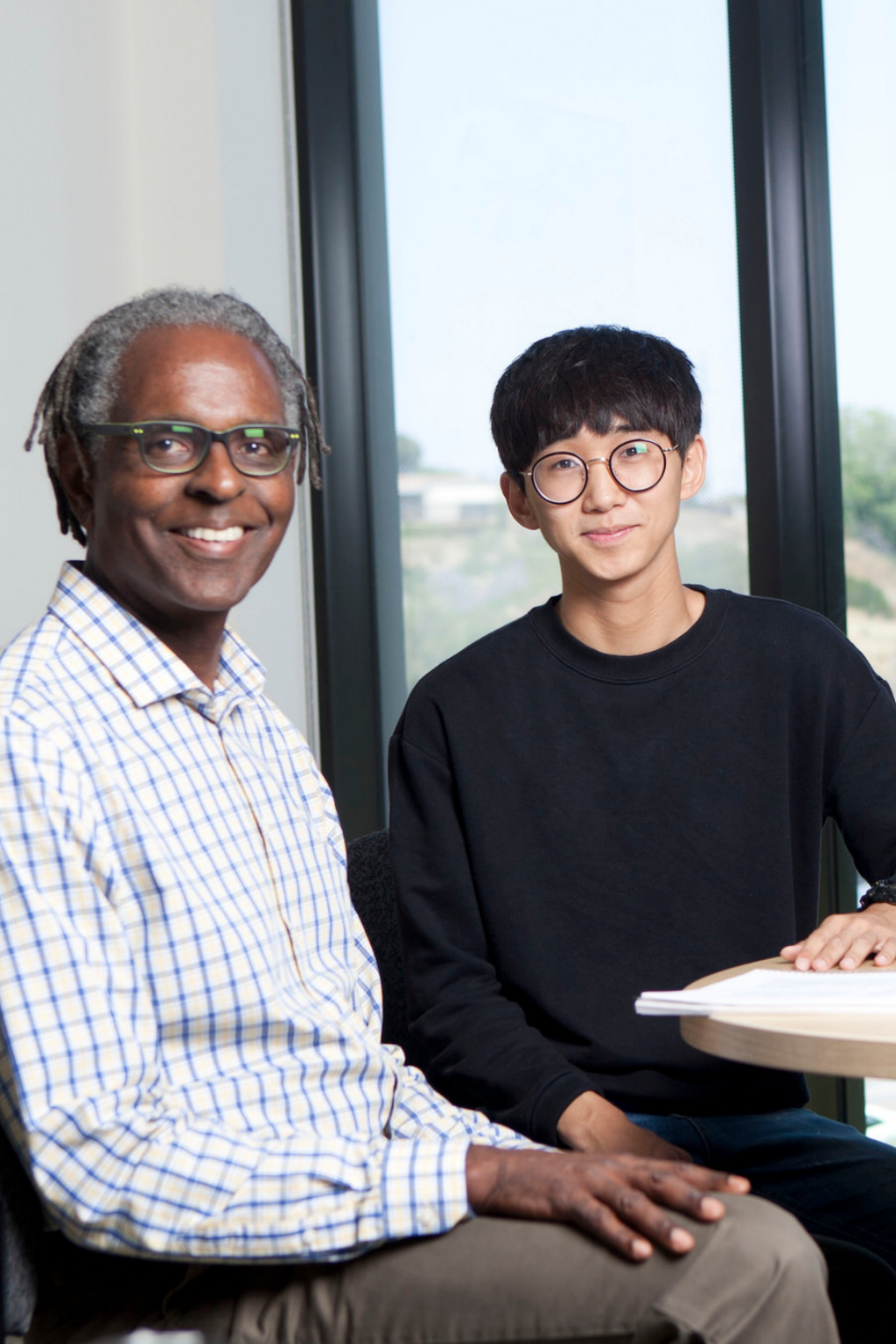
